

BEATEN AFTER A FINE BATTLE.

The Angels Hit the Sphere Very Much Out of Luck.

A Game That Was Enjoyed by a Big Crowd.

The Tufts-Lyons Win at San Diego by a Score of Five to Two—Gossip About the Game—The Last Game This Afternoon.

Luck, that fickle goddess of fortune, did not smile on Los Angeles yesterday. The continued hard luck which clung to the locals was positively chilling on the nerves of one of the largest crowds of the season, even if the sun did beat down on the bleachers with a vigor that is always a reminder of the near approach of the national holiday.

The pictures of the Angels were turned to the wall at the very outset, and lightning struck them every time they managed to get two men on bases. The crowd came ready to shout at the slightest provocation, but they did not get much encouragement to yell themselves hoarse.

The game was a corker, although it did not go the right way for the crowd. Everybody got value for their money and went home satisfied. The locals played hard for victory. Roach pitched good enough ball to win, notwithstanding that the Dukes managed to get in their most effective hits just inside the one line. Two corking smashes in one inning grazed the third bag. The Angels, however, never encountered such trouble in getting men around the bases. Twice they were shut out with a double play when runs looked as sure as the discovery of the HERALD glacier.

The Dukes began to display their expertness in running bases in the first venture. McGucken led off with a two bagger. Elbright contributed a base hit and Dooley's smash past Stafford let in two runs.

The Angels got in one run in the second. Hasamaer opened up with a magnificent three-base hit, which was really a home run drive if the superfluous weeds were removed. Hasamaer scored on Glenalvin's base hit.

It looked as if the Angels would get in two more runs in the fourth, but the bats were not propitious. The visitors put a cinch on the game in the fifth. McGucken made one of those two baggers which he loves more dearly than even coin. Clark's carpet drive past the third bag scored the Duke and another haymaker dashed home on a passed ball.

The locals made an heroic effort to tie the San Jose score in the eighth. Tredway reached the initial on a slow hit to Denny. Hasamaer was caught out. Glenalvin sent Tredway to third on a drive to center. With only one hand out everything looked favorable for a run or two. The most enthusiastic of the fans conjured up a grand stand finish, but a double play dashed their hopes to the ground with a dull, sizzling bang, as the accident reporter would say. It was another futile attempt in the ninth, and the game ended in favor of Duke Finn's toboggan sliders by a score of 5 to 2.

The game was replete with sharp plays. McGucken made a brilliant running catch. Glenalvin gave the bleachers a sample of his skill as a second baseman, by making a phenomenal stop. A glance at the score shows that the Los Angeles infield had no less than thirty-three chances with only one error. The San Jose infield had thirty-four chances, only one getting away from them. QUESTIONS, important as they are, as subordinate to the great issues now pressing for solution, and upon which not only individual prosperity, but the very existence of free institutions depends; and we ask all men to first help us determine whether we are to have a republic to administer, before we differ as to the conditions upon which it is to be administered.

Believing that the forces of reform this day set in motion will never cease to move forward until every wrong is removed and equal privileges securely established for all men and women, we declare therefore:

First—That the union of the labor forces of the United States this day consummated shall be permanent and perpetual; may its spirit enter into all hearers for the salvation of the republic and the uplifting of mankind.

Second—Wealth belongs to him who created it, and every dollar taken from industry without an equivalent, is robbery. "If any man will not work, neither shall he eat."

Third—We believe the time has come when railroad corporations must either own the people, or the people the corporations. And should the government enter upon the work of owning and managing any or all the railroads, we should favor an amendment to the constitution, that all employees upon such roads shall for the time being forego the exercise of their right of suffrage, in accordance with the precedent established by the constitution as to the inhabitants of the District of Columbia.

THE BELLAMYITES. Nationalist Delegates Hold an Enthusiastic Meeting.

OMAHA, July 3.—The Bellamy ideas are advanced by hundreds of delegates, and today fully two hundred of them met. Major Henry Winn, of Massachusetts, presided. Nearly all the states and territories were represented.

Dr. Tucker, of Ohio, declared that Ohio was rapidly passing into the hands of the Nationalists, and that the time was not far distant when they would dictate terms to the old political parties of the state. He believed ere long the Bellamy idea would take root and be a popular theory.

William Penn Rogers, of California, declared that the most of the people in his state were Socialists, and that a remarkable reformation had been brought about by a careful study of Bellamy's books.

Coax of Connecticut saw no other way out of the financial difficulty than to accept nationalism. The People's party, he said, would never amount to anything until it took up the ideas of nationalism.

James Ballinger, of Des Moines, told what he knew of land monopolies in Iowa, and Mrs. Kingman told a story from Oregon.

Some one in the audience wanted to know where the money came from which published single-tax literature, and a man in the gallery shouted: "Out here; it's free silver," and flung a dollar on the stage. This was followed by a shower of silver from all sides, and the meeting adjourned.

STRIKERS ON GUARD. Carnegie's Homestead Steel Mills Closely Watched.

PITTSBURGH, July 3.—The iron and steel strike situation presented no new features today. Quiet reigned supreme at Homestead, and nothing occurred here to disturb the usual Sunday serenity. The strikers organization at Homestead is the most thorough ever known. They have divided their watches into three reliefs of eight hours each, and the guards have so completely surrounded the big steel plant that it would be impossible for one to get inside without their knowledge. No change in the situation is expected for several days.

A PAYMASTER ROBBED.

EAGLE PASS, Texas, July 3.—J. E. Garner, book-keeper of the Santa Rosa Smelting company, started for the works yesterday with \$3000 to pay off the men. He was in a carriage, with a negro driver about three miles from Santa Rosa, when he was attacked by robbers and a battle ensued.

Garner had a Winchester, and succeeded in killing one of the bandits and wounding another. He then escaped on the horse, the negro driver having been killed. The robbers secured the money.
