TURN VEREIN SHARPSHOOTERS

A Grand Prize Shooting Match to be Held at San Diego.

The Turn Verein Germania of Los Angeles will hold a grand prize shooting match at San Diego on Sunday, September 4, 1892, in which all marksmen are invited to participate. The rules and regulations of the match are as follows, in their general terms:

Shooting at 200 yards, standing, off-hand, at German 25 ring target. Highest possible score in ten shots, 250 points; all kinds of rifles, triggers and sights, except telescope, are allowed.

Team Shooting.—One team shall consist of six men, who will shoot ten shots each at above mentioned target, for a valuable trophy, which shall become the property of the winning team. In this team shooting match, competing military teams using military regulation rifle (6 pounds pull) are allowed one point per shot, making a handicap of ten points per score, or sixty points per team. The participating team must belong to a company or organization which has been in existence at least three months previous to this contest.

After team shooting, grand shooting for valuable prizes. In this shooting no handicap will be given. Three shots will be a score, and each contestant can shoot as many scores as he desires. Highest score possible, 75, will take first prize.

The contest will close at 5 p. m.

SOME POLITICAL POINTS.

THE MEETING OF THE DEMOCRATIC CITY COMMITTEE.

Mr. Ling's Assessment Considered. Other Matters Acted Upon—German Democrats Meet.

The Democratic city central committee held a meeting last evening to close up the work of the last city campaign.

Mr. Kelly presided and Mr. Melvill was secretary. No very important business was transacted by the committee, further than to generally supervise the expenditures which the last unfortunate local campaign involved.

A motion was made that R. A. Ling, who was the nominee for Mayor two years ago, be requested to pay a sum of money yet delinquent upon his assessment at that time. The motion was generally discussed. Some of the members wanted to turn all interest, right and title of the committee to the assessment over to the Union League Republican club.

The matter of filling vacancies then came up. Secretary Melvill said that when his attention had been called to vacancies in the precincts he had recommended that the Democrats of the precinct join in a written recommendation to the committee of some suitable person to represent the precinct.

A communication was received recommending Jas. Bothwell as committee-man from the Sixteenth precinct, in the place of Geo. Gates, deceased. The matter went over until next meeting.

The county central committee, through Mr. Ramish, tendered the use of its rooms, and the offer was accepted with thanks. A resolution of thanks to J. M. Brooks, for the use of his rooms, was passed.

Mr. Threlkeld moved that as the time of the campaign was drawing near, that precinct clubs be formed. Mr. Chick moved, as an amendment, that the matter of precinct clubs be deferred until the next meeting, which was carried.

The committee adjourned to meet August 20th, at 7:30 p. m., at No. 115 1/2 South Spring street. At that time the matter of the city campaign, which opens this fall, will be taken under consideration.

The Democratic party will, this year, endeavor to regain control of the city government and resume an administration of economy, which has been interrupted for several years, owing to Republican ascendancy. The idea now seems to be to hold early primaries.

GERMAN DEMOCRATS MEET.

There was a rousing meeting of the German Democratic club, last evening, at Democratic headquarters, 115 1/2 South Spring street. A number of well-known German citizens were present and pledged their allegiance to the national Democratic ticket. The club has quite a large membership, and is in the best of shape to do some excellent work for Cleveland, Stevenson and the Democratic county ticket, between now and November.

THE JUDGES AND NATURALIZATION.

During the last few days a great many foreign-born citizens have taken out final papers of naturalization, and some funny things have happened. Now take this instance. A party has been taken before the superior judge to get his final papers, so as to vote this fall, by some one connected with the Democratic naturalization bureau. The judge has seen fit to decline to give him his final papers on the ground that the party was not well enough informed as to the character of the government under which he lived to become a citizen. The reason was all right, if well founded. The judge, of course, knew that the applicant for final papers would in all probability vote the Democratic ticket if he became a citizen for the reason that a Democrat had brought him to the court room.

But here is where the amusing part of the business comes in. This same party has been sent to the Republican naturalization bureau to get assistance in getting his final papers. He is taken to the court room by a Republican and the judge gives him all that he applies for without any ado. All of the six superior judges are at present Republicans.

MR. SHORB'S POSITION.

Hon. J. De Barth Shorb was in the city, yesterday, and was asked by a HERALD reporter about his position regarding the Democratic congressional nomination.

"If the nomination comes to me," said Mr. Shorb, "I will accept it, and will do my best to be elected. I am not in the least actuated by any personal desire for the office, but I feel that I could be of considerable help to this district, and could advance its interests materially."

STILL A MYSTERY.

The Republican political headquarters, opened up in the Nadeau hotel, by George Atwood and Frank Cherry, still remain a mystery to the Republican leaders, who cannot yet understand why they exist. Messrs. Atwood and Cherry seem to be contented to let the boys remain in ignorance and spend their weary hours in conjecturing just what they are doing, and intend to do, by opening up expensive headquarters like those in the Nadeau.

Some one claims that the only object in view is to purify Republican primaries. This is a difficult job, that almost defies the ablest talent. If Messrs. Atwood and Cherry succeed in a great work of this kind, they will have accomplished a wonderful feat. Another party states that the element of the Republicans that Mr. Cherry and Mr. Atwood represent, intend putting up a full ticket in every ward at the next Republican primary, and that they are now fixing and arranging to win the fight. But nothing absolutely authentic can be gleaned from any source, owing to the close-mouthed policy Mr. Cherry and his confere are pursuing.

UNFORTUNATE JEALOUSY.

The Union League has become jealous of the growing influence of the Lincoln club in the Republican politics of the county. The members of both organizations are of the Republican faith. The Union League is the oldest, while the Lincoln club is only an infant, so to speak. But it seems that the league, which virtually controls both the city and county government at present, has permitted itself to be dominated by a clique, who use the organization largely to accomplish their own personal aims and ends. They have swayed it for so long a time that they have it well in hand.

This has disgusted a great many Republicans and caused considerable dissatisfaction. For a Republican to kick

against the iron rule of a few leaders who handled the league so cleverly, meant political ostracism until recently. A man had to submit to the dictates of the league ring or get out of the party.

Since the Lincoln club bloomed forth, though, the Republicans who did not approve of the Union League ideas of running things with such a high hand, have had another place to go and they have availed themselves of the opportunity by adding their names to the club rolls.

The growing importance of the new club is the source of great worry to the Union League magnates who are not at all desirous of giving up the control they now hold. It is a very fat thing to hold the reins as they have held them for several years and they are not willing to divide even with their own partisans. Evidence of this jealousy on the part of the league was plainly manifested at the Lindley ratification meeting, which was held at the Lincoln club rooms last week.

A NEAT LITTLE TRICK.

The constitution and by-laws of the Republican ward clubs, which some few citizens are signing, are rather deceptive. There is a clause in the document which pledges the signer to vote the entire Republican ticket from top to bottom. This is a great thing for the bosses. They can dictate the nomination of some objectionable or unfit person for an important office, and then claim that a person is obligated to vote for him because he is the nominee and because the person signed the constitution of this or that ward club. This is a trap laid to catch unwary citizens who may be bamboozled into joining a Republican ward club.

The Republicans realize that to hold their party vote this year they will have to employ all manner of small tricks, and this is one of them.
