

NEWS FROM NEAR-BY CITIES.

A Shocking Criminal Case Reported from Pasadena.

Long Beach Wants a System of Street Lighting.

The Terminal and a Pasadena Street. Pomona People and Matters—Redondo Marine News, Etc. Covina Notes.

PASADENA, Aug. 13.—A case has turned up in this usually quiet city that for horrible details will rival the famous Garrett case which attracted so much attention in Los Angeles, and the perpetrator of the deed, if it can be proven, should be placed where he can do no more evil for the rest of his natural life. The first intimation of the existence of any thing wrong was this morning, when Mrs. Dodson Moore called at the police station and swore to a complaint against Christ, Juan, charging him with an attempt to commit rape, and naming as his victim his daughter, Miss Juan. The man Juan, who is charged with this crime, is a Swiss, about 35 years of age. Up to about six months ago he was in the employ of the water company, but was discharged on account of drunkenness. Since that time he has been on a continued spree. His daughter, who is a member of the Salvation army, is a good looking and modest appearing girl about 15 years old, and the store of abuse she tells is pitiful. There is quite a family, consisting of several younger children, and Mrs. Juan, who speaks English with difficulty, but appears to be a very respectable woman and shows evidence of culture. It appears from the story of both mother and daughters, that Juan is a very fond. He is in the habit of coming home in an intoxicated condition, and not only beating his wife and children, but had made repeated attempts to outrage his daughter, although she denies that he succeeded in accomplishing his purpose. The warrant for his arrest was placed in the hands of Marshall Buchanan late in the day. It seems he had gotten wind of the matter and was making tracks out of town as fast as possible. He was finally tracked down to Laramida Park, Marshall Buchanan deserves much credit for his prompt arrest, for it would have been nearly impossible to have taken him had he once reached the mountains. As it is he is safely behind the bars and likely to stay there.

A CHARITY HOSPITAL. The Pasadena Hospital society, an organization which has been started for charitable purposes, met this afternoon at A. R. Metcalf's office and transacted considerable business. Mr. J. W. Scoville, who has taken an active part in the association since it started, reported the purchase of four lots on Raymond avenue between Painter and Illinois street where the building will be located. An effort will be made to establish a paid up capital of \$25,000, of which amount Mr. Scoville has agreed to give \$5000. This association is endeavoring to carry out a noble work and should receive the support of the community.

CHEAP JOHN REMEMBERED. Many Pasadena's will remember the case of Cheap John, the colored restaurant keeper, who was arrested for selling liquor, contrary to the city ordinance, about a year ago, and after paying his fine suddenly disappeared. It appears that at the time of his sudden taking off a warrant was hanging over him, but had not been served. Since that time he has been ransacking in the republic of Mexico. Supposing that the thing had all blown over, he returned to his old haunts this morning, and was promptly arrested by Marshall Buchanan before he had been in town a half hour. He was released on bail, and his trial will come off in a few days.

THE TERMINAL AND COLORADO STREET. The meeting of the city council next Monday will be devoted to the consideration of the proposed granting to the Terminal Railroad company of a privilege to lay tracks across Colorado street. Both sides will be out in arms and promise to make the meeting extremely interesting. The citizens opposing the company's request claim that the company may do away with the necessity of laying additional tracks across the street by purchasing a tract of land lying north of that already owned by them. It is difficult to say what will be the outcome.

LONG BEACH. Street Lighting Approved.—The Trustees, Baseball Etc. LONG BEACH, Aug. 13.—The suggestion of the HERALD yesterday that the trustees pass an ordinance for lighting the streets met with the approval of the citizens of this place. In conversation with one today he stated that the business men had agitated the matter last year and many had offered to help pay for the improvement but for some reason the trustees did not pass the law. However as they hold a meeting in the early part of next week some action will probably be taken as now is the time that the lights are the most needed.

SAN PEDRO. Some Police Court Cases—Shipping Matters.—SAN PEDRO, Aug. 13.—Today Constable W. H. Carpenter took Andrew Stevens to Los Angeles to serve a sentence of six months pronounced against him in May last. Stevens is a sailor by profession, but by trade is nothing. He was living with a woman at Nigger Brown's dance house and, as is usual in such cases, she supplied him with money and received nothing but kicks for her pains. About May 9th he was arrested and charged with being a vag. He had formerly been a member of the Sailors' union, but had gradually drifted away from them. However, they held several meetings and agreed to fix it so that he would be the first man to ship. So they went to the office of the peace and it was agreed that Stevens should plead guilty and be given a fender and would immediately leave town. When brought before Justice Sweet, he pleaded guilty and was given a fender of six months. He soon afterwards shipped on the Commodore, where he stayed for about two months. He did not attend to business properly, and was discharged when the boat returned to San Pedro about two weeks ago. The authorities would have left him alone then, but he soon returned to his old life, and a few nights ago followed the woman about and tried to beat her, and smashed a window in doing so. He was prevented from hurting the woman by her companion, but caught her soon afterward and inflicted a terrible beating upon her. The woman's companion of the previous night, wanted Stevens arrested, but as he would not appear against him, Stevens was arrested on the old finding and taken to Los Angeles in the afternoon. An attempt will probably be made to have him released on habeas corpus. Minnie Tasker was the defendant before Justice Johnson today, charged with disturbing the peace of Maggie Bailey. Both women are members of Brown's dance house. Some very disgusting testimony was given, but as the two sides conflicted materially, the defendant was discharged.
