KEEPING OUT CHOLERA.

Efforts to Stay the Plague in Europe.

Three Western Europe Ports Now Infected.

The Disease Epidemic in Hamburg, Antwerp and Havre.

Prompt Action Taken by the American Authorities to Prevent Its Introduction in This Country.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24.—The following dispatch was received today at the state department, from the United States consul at Hamburg: "Hamburg emigrants must be regarded as coming from cholera-infected districts. See that steamers and baggage are disinfected."

The treasury department is following up the precautions heretofore adopted, and will use all the means at hand to keep cholera out of the country.

PREPARATIONS AT NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, Aug. 24.—The quarantine officials at this port are busy preparing to prevent any importation of cholera from infected European ports.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Aug. 24.—Having been officially notified of the prevalence of cholera in foreign ports, the board of health, at a meeting today, adopted stringent measures to prevent the disease from being introduced into the country through this port.

QUARANTINE INSPECTION.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Aug. 24.—Dr. J. N. McCormick, of Bowling Green, president of the international conference of state boards of health, has called a meeting of the executive committee, to consider the matter of appointing a committee to inspect all the quarantine stations on the Atlantic and Pacific coasts, with a view to ascertaining their efficiency in preventing the introduction of cholera into this country.

ENGLISH PRECAUTIONS.

LONDON, Aug. 24.—The local government board has sent inspectors to all the chief English ports, empowered with full authority to use all means, short of quarantine, to exclude cholera from the country.

THE EPIDEMIC AT HAMBURG.

All Parts of the City and Suburbs Now Infected. LONDON, Aug. 24.—A Hamburg special says: Cholera has appeared in all parts of the city and suburbs, though it is worse in the harbor quarter.

The Standard's Berlin correspondent says a soldier afflicted with Asiatic cholera has been found there. HAMBURG, Aug. 24.—The streets of this city present a lugubrious aspect.

Official statistics show that during the period between August 18th and yesterday, there were 219 cases of suspected cholera. Of this number, seventy-five patients died. Today the heat is oppressive, despite a heavy thunderstorm.

Business proceeds as usual. The schools were closed the greater part of the day. The police and sanitary authorities, at a conference today, discussed the eventual closing of the harbor unless the epidemic speedily subsides.

ANTWERP INFECTED.

Cholera Epidemic in the Principal Seaport of Belgium. ANTWERP, Aug. 24.—Asiatic cholera prevails here. It is now present at Hamburg, Antwerp and Havre, the three great western European ports.

Since noon yesterday five persons, suffering from cholera and admitted to

the hospital, have died a few hours after their admission. One case of the disease has appeared on board a steamer from Hamburg. The sanitary board has ordered the most rigorous inspection of all vessels arriving from Hamburg, Rhine ports and France.

BRITISH CABINET.

All the Members of the New Ministry Re-elected to Parliament. LONDON, Aug. 24.—Sir William Vernon Harcourt has been re-elected by an increased majority. With the exception of Sir William Vernon Harcourt and John Morley, all the new ministers were formally re-elected without opposition.

Homestead Voters' Lawyers. PITTSBURGH, Pa., Aug. 24.—Attorneys Argo and Irwin, western lawyers who volunteered their services to the Amalgamated association in helping the defense of the Homestead men against whom charges of murder were entered, arrived in the city this morning.

AN ACCIDENT ON THE TRACK AT THE NAPA FAIR.

Richmond, Jr., Beats Frank M.—A San Diego Horse Wins Honors at Santa Barbara—The Chico Fair.

NAPA, Aug. 24.—This afternoon at the race track, while warming up for the 3-year-old district trot, Thomas Smith, of Vallejo, driving Columbus, and Clarence Hill, of Napa, driving Lacona, owned by Fred W. Loeber, of Vineland, collided.

THE HEAT IN EUROPE. Many Deaths Caused by Sunstroke—The Scarcity of Water. BERLIN, Aug. 24.—The thermometer registered 89 in the shade here today.

VIENNA, Aug. 24.—Eighteen deaths were caused by heat in this city today. While a regiment was marching from Kaschan to Borsod today, 250 soldiers were prostrated by the heat, and three are dead.

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STRIKE DECLARED OFF.

Buffalo Switchmen Abandon the Contest.

It Failed for Lack of Fraternal Support.

Sweeney Compelled to Acknowledge Defeat.

About Half the Strikers Will Be Re-employed—The Rest Will Have to Seek Pastures New.

By the Associated Press.] BUFFALO, N. Y., Aug. 24.—At midnight tonight Sweeney, head of the switchmen's order, officially recognized the fact that the strike movement of the switchmen, which was inaugurated twelve days ago, has failed.

SWITCHMEN UNSUPPORTED. By noon today all the railroad labor chiefs, save Arthur and Thurston, were in the city. At 4 o'clock this afternoon the leaders went into conference.

COMPULSED TO GIVE IN. Sweeney proceeded at once to the conference of the local representatives of the switchmen. This proceeded until after 11 o'clock.

Word was carried out towards the East Buffalo yard at once by messengers, and before dawn the idle switchmen knew they were at liberty to seek work where they could.

AN OFFICIAL INQUIRY. The state board of arbitration met this morning and heard evidence about the strike. A copy of the recent ten-hour law was placed in evidence.

MORE SHOOTING DONE. A detachment of Company I, Twenty-third regiment, of Brooklyn, in command of Lieut. J. F. Handy, had trouble with some men in the freight yards of the New York Central, at Cheltonaga, early this morning.

A DYING STRIKER'S STATEMENT. The ante-mortem statement of Thomas Monahan, who was shot at the Tift farm last night by members of the Twenty-second regiment, was taken this morning.

World's Safety Record Broken. SPRINGFIELD, Mass., Aug. 24.—P. J. Berlo rode two miles on the Hampden park track this afternoon in 4 minutes, 48 2/5 seconds, breaking the world's record of 4 minutes, 48 4/5 seconds, made by Taylor last fall.

Arrangements Made for the Completion of the Big Ditch. PARIS, Aug. 24.—The newspaper Paris says the liquidation of the Panama canal company has concluded an agreement with Heilard, vice-president of the Paris chamber of commerce, providing for the formation of another company with a capital of \$30,000,000, to resume work on the Panama canal.
