The World's Champion Meets Ignominious Defeat.

James J. Corbett Whipped Him in Twenty-one Rounds.

The Boston Bully Badly Battered—The California Boy Finished Fresh as a Daisy—Great Rejoicing at Corbett's Home.

By the Associated Press. NEW ORLEANS, La., Sept. 7.—The laurel has shifted. John L. Sullivan has had some new sensations; so has James Corbett.

The impression left by the rapid spectacle is that Sullivan was at no moment in the path of success, and physical evidences of this were apparent at the finish.

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It could not be. There was a cumulation of age and wide freedom which could not be trained away without impairing the man.

His was the capital of brain and muscle upon which to build up a fortune of victory and reputation.

Somehow there is homage in the eager attention the trainers bestow upon their champion, and tonight, while Sullivan enjoyed this, his heavy form sank down as he sat waiting for the preliminaries.

THE GREAT BATTLE. Sullivan Goes Down Before the Invincible Californian.

AT THE RING SIDE, OLYMPIC CLUB, NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 7.—The excitement that has prevailed in this city has had no parallel since the Italian assassination eighteen months ago.

There was a universal move in the direction of the club, even before evening began to fall.

The Sullivan people came to the club first. They took a carriage at the hotel before 7 o'clock, and drove leisurely down with the string of hacks.

The first sign of the contest for the championship of America came in the person of Police Captain Barrett, who went into the ring at five minutes to 9 o'clock.

Police Captain Barrett stepped to the center of the ring and presented Prof. John Duffy with a beautiful silver icicle and ladle.

In a parley which was held in the center of the ring, Corbett looked entirely outclassed in point of build, though his friends relied upon his cleverness to win the battle.

At 9:10 the battle commenced. Sullivan immediately became the aggressor. He made a left lead, and was stopped. Corbett danced all about his opponent, eyeing him closely.

Round two—Sully was still the aggressor. He upper-cut Jim, and touched him again with his left hand a little later.

Round three—Corbett ducked away from a heavy lunge. Sully followed him about the ring, trying for the stomach.

RIGORS OF QUARANTINE.

Hardships Suffered by Cabin Passengers.

Bitter Complaints Against the Shipmasters.

Dr. Jenkins Asks Permission to Land Them On Fire Island.

Secretary Foster's Wife Among the Detained Passengers on the City of New York—Latest Cholera Reports.

QUARANTINE, N. Y., Sept. 7.—Dr. Jenkins this evening wrote the secretary of the treasury, calling attention to the hardship of detaining the cabin passengers of incoming steamers, on overcrowded vessels which are infected or sailed from infected ports.

A letter was published this evening from one of the lady passengers on the Normanna, complaining about their being shut up, and speaking bitterly of the way the steamship company has neglected them.

This afternoon Dr. Depew, on the city of New York, sent his compliments to Dr. Jenkins, and regretted that the health officer had not been able to board the human liner in person.

The passengers of the steamer La Bourgogne will probably be released tomorrow morning, and possibly the ship also.

Dr. Depew said he had spent much time in Hamburg. The cholera scare is great in Europe, especially among Americans.

NEW CASES ON THE NORMANNA. Dr. Jenkins reported two new cases among the crew on the steamship Normanna, and no deaths.

FEELING OF ALARM SUBSIDED. NEW YORK, Sept. 7.—The weather was brighter, more frosty and more bracing today than any day since cholera has made its appearance.
