Afternoon Dispatches.

St. Louis, Jan. 13.

A prize fight between Allen and Davis took place on Chouteau Island, near the spot where McCool fought Davis over two years ago. There were about 300 persons present. The fight commenced about noon; forty-three rounds were fought and the fight was won by Allen. Davis was terribly punished, but Allen looked comparatively fresh and received but few injuries. At the close of the fight the pugilist, Gallagher, offered to fight the winner for a thousand dollars. Allen accepted the challenge, agreeing to fight him in five weeks. It is understood the articles of agreement will be signed to-night and forfeits put up.

San Francisco, Jan. 13.

Mexican advices have a rumor that Vega, Governor of Colima, has obtained three months' leave of absence to visit the interior.

Vega's endeavors to make the State Legislature more liberal in regard to the system of taxation lately introduced were unsuccessful. The most influential citizens will probably leave the State.

Terrible land slides have occurred in different parts of the country.

New York, Jan. 13.

A correspondent of the Herald who had a conversation with Gen. Frank Blair in Washington says: The General still holds to his expressed opinion that Gen. Grant will make a Dictator or an Emperor of himself before he leaves the White House. His modest deportment is simply deep dissimulation, and always used by ambitious men since Julius Caesar thrice refused the crown. The country is always ruled by a minority who demand the aid of bayonets, and it will be easy for Grant with his military power to make himself supreme.

On Saturday evening Dr. Smart was summoned to attend two dying women, Mrs. Louisa Cook and Miss Jane V. Revland, who reside in South Second street, Jersey City, having had domestic troubles which they thought themselves too weak to bear. The women had bought morphine and took a heavy dose, resolving to die together. Having been restored to consciousness, they expressed their indignation that they had not been permitted to die.

There has been a great deal of figuring to-day between buyer and seller, and the transactions have been few at this point. Sales were made at Titusville of two lots, 1,600 bbls. each, at \$5.75; at Miller Farm 4 cars, \$5.50; at Petroleum Centre 4 cars, \$5.50, 160 bbls. p. t. At Oil City sales were made at \$6.10. As we go to press \$5.75 is being offered here and refused. Shipments from this point, Jan. 12, were: 1,076 barrels crude.
