Paris, Sept. 5. The Empire is ended. Excitement intense here.

Signed, WASHBURN. Mr. Washburn is U. S. Minister at Paris.

Latest and Most Important War News.

Berlin, Sept. 3. A dispatch just received has the following since Wednesday last:

Bazaine has steadily sought to escape to the North, but has always been frustrated by Gen. Mantuffel, directed by Prince Frederick Charles.

It is believed in Paris that McMahon is acting on the defensive; that on Thursday he destroyed the Purselan left, obliging the Crown Prince to fall back on the hills of Argonne.

Menton Court—noon, Friday. Since Wednesday morning Bazaine has tried to get to the Northward from Metz.

The forces of Prince Frederick Charles and Gen. Mantuffel repelled his efforts especially in the battle that may be styled the battle of Noisse.

The French were flung back within the fortress. The Prussian force in this battle was composed of the 1st and 3d corps and a portion of the Landwehr.

The conflict occurred for the most part around Serigny and Noisseville. The following dispatch from Berlin is just received: Particulars of the 1st are still deficient, though at Paris it is thought the contest resulted favorably for the French.

The Emperor certainly made a demand for a truce by letter and then came in and surrendered.

Paris telegrams continue to say that McMahon holds out under the shelter of the fortress; and that Bazaine's position is good and that he lacks neither provision nor men.

Martial law has been declared in Algeria. The Russian press is united in sympathy with Prussia.

Washington, Sept. 3. The following has been received from the State Department, London: The Emperor Napoleon surrendered yesterday at Sedan to the King of Prussia.

The whole French army are prisoners of war. [Signed] MOTLEY. New York, Sept. 3.

A dispatch just received at this office says that King William announced to Queen Augusta the surrender of the whole French army at Sedan, including the Emperor himself.

A special dispatch from the seat of war reports the most brilliant Prussian success. Twenty thousand Prussians and ten thousand French soldiers lay killed and wounded upon the field of battle.

It is rumored that Marshal Bazaine, with his entire force in occupation of Metz surrendered at 4 yesterday to the army investing that fortress on receipts of the news of surrender of the Emperor.

JUDGEMENTS AND MORTGAGES.—In 1869 the Legislature, in view of the difficulty which was encountered in borrowing money at six per cent. in competition with the United States bonds—which were free of tax and producing a much larger interest—passed a law exempting mortgages and judgements not given by corporations, from all taxation except that by the State.

The county of Lancaster accordingly, in obedience to the law, levied no tax last year on judgements and mortgages; the city of Lancaster, however, construed the law as applying only to mortgages and judgements for purchase money, and, therefore, insisted on taxing all other judgements and mortgages.

The question has been brought to a legal test before the Court of that county, and it has been decided that judgements and mortgages of no kind are liable for taxation, whether held as security for purchase money or by parties at second hand as a safe investment for their spare capital.

This decision will be read with great interest in all parts of the State, and will have a tendency to induce men of means to invest more largely in this class of securities.
