It appears from the evidence on the trial, that the negro was suspected of stealing, in consequence of which they tied a rope round his neck, and dragged him by it, beating him at the same time with hickory sticks and a loaded horse-whip. The whole proceeding was marked with a great deal of barbarity; the consequence was the negro died in about two hours: the men have been found guilty of murder, and have been sentenced to five years confinement in the Goal and Penitentiary house of Philadelphia; six months of the time to be kept in solitude, and the residue at hard labour.

The youngest of these men is above sixty years of age. The Judge admonished them in the most solemn manner to repentance for so great a crime. He mentioned that it was most probable the Jury would be justified in finding their offence murder in the first degree.

He was a middle sized man, dressed in a short blue jacket and trowsers.

Extract of a letter from Norfolk, to a gentleman in New-York, dated September 6. "I suspect you will be without the Herald this day, as the sickness prevails very much in the Printing Office. There have been upwards of 105 new cases for the last 4 days, and I suspect upwards of 24 or 26 deaths.

"Request you to get the following statement published, of an unfortunate affair which took place lately in the adjoining State. We yesterday learnt the disagreeable news of the death of Dr. Rameck, of Edenton, which is as follows: Dr. Rameck has been a long time at variance with Dr. Ryan Butler, of Kempville. They met near Edenton, and exchanged three shots; when the Magistrate interfered and put an end to the business. On Thursday last they met again on the line which separates Virginia from Carolina, and again exchanged three shots; when the last of Dr. Rameck's shots entered the thigh of Dr. Butler and broke it, the business thus ended. Dr. Rameck went home and sat up a great part of the night with some friends; in the morning he arose, dressed himself, and ordered his servant to saddle his horse, as he was to ride out. When the servant was gone, he went into a small room adjoining his shop, and put a pistol to each of his temples, and blew his brains out—thus ended Dr. Rameck.

From the GEORGIA GAZETTE. Vice Consuls of Spain for the States of North Carolina, South Carolina, and Georgia. Messrs. Nicholas Johnston and Co. Gentlemen, His Excellency Lieutenant Colonel Don Vincent Polch, Governor of the Province of West Florida, in a letter, dated Panzacola, 11 August, has been pleased to communicate to me the following: "I have issued a proclamation, offering FOUR THOUSAND FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS to any person who will deliver here, or in Apalache, the body of WILLIAM AUGUSTUS BOWLES, or else produce sufficient proof of having killed him; which information I will thank you to make public, in order that some clever fellow, at the cheap rate of one gun shot, will place in his pocket the said sum, which shall be paid, with the greatest acknowledgment of gratitude, in good Spanish dollars, without the least delay.

From Halifax—Aug. 14. Admiral Parker has arrived from England. A change is expected in the admiralty Court. A regiment of troops have arrived—two are to go from hence for England. An expedition from England against Guadalupe is thought to be in contemplation. At the time of Admiral Parker's sailing from England, there was no rumour nor expectation of a war with the United States, which has been so much talked of here.
