As a republication of the report of a committee of Congress containing every essential fact, relative to the present and former state of the American debt, preceded the publication of the last essay, it can scarcely be necessary now to repeat the whole, and yet that the contrast between the genuine facts, the real TRUTHS, and the many preposterous contradictory results, which have been drawn by and from Gallatin's mischievous essays, may appear in their true shape, to strike conviction home to the minds of the weakest member of our republic and thus to defeat the base, the wicked intentions of Gallatin and his school of foreign and domestic villains. The foot of the accounts which passed through examination, from the treasury to the committee, from the committee to Congress, and thence to the world, is, here again repeated, viz.

Left at Port Republic Brig Delight, Glazier, of Philadelphia, to sail in about 18 days.

Brig Experiment, to sail in about 14 days for Wilmington. (Del.)

Brig Harriot, of Newburyport, capt. Smith, arrived at Port Republic Aug. 31. On her passage, Sept. 11 fell in with the United States sloop of war Herald, capt. Ruffel, who had under his convoy the following vessels; ship Dispatch, Martin, of and for Philadelphia; brig Charleston; and for Charleston, brig Union, of and for Bolton; schr. Roebuck, Allen, of and for Gloucester, New England.

Sept. 17, in lat 23, 47, long 7.2, parted with the schr. Lion, and the other above mentioned vessels.

Ship Molly, Calvert, 45 days from Liverpool. Sailed from thence in company with Ship Industry Reynolds, of and for New York and ship Washington, Scott, of and for Bolton. Left there the following vessels—Ship Mats, of New York; Ship Briefes, of do.—Ship Hector, of do, and Ship Milburi, Lark, of Philadelphia, to sail the 20th August. Spoke on the 9th September lat 44. W. the Ship Randolph, of and from Amsterdam, and on the 25 ult. lat 40, 20-N. long. 68, no. W. Spoke the Ship Cleopatra, of and from New-York to London.

Capt. Middleton of the ship Orono, Sept. 10 spoke ship Mar. aret. of New-York capt. Marsh, bound to Liverpool, out 9 days. lat 38. 40 long. 64, who informed that the day before picked up a yawl belonging to the ship Newport, of Bolton, and at the same time saw a great deal of tobacco afloat, between 20 and 30 hogheads.

Brig John, Atkins, of and for Philadelphia, 34 days from Lisbon, was spoken the 13th instant, latitude 43. 19. N. having on board the crew of the ship Orion, of New York, foundered at sea.

Schr. Bilbao, Perkins, from hence, to St. Sebastian, was spoken on the 6th ult. in latitude 49. 40. N. longitude 30, 20. W. all well, out nineteen days.

Brig Peggy, Cotta, from hence, has arrived at Co k.

BOSTON, September 25

Arrived, snow Mary, Cobb, St. Petersburg (Russia) 86 days. This is the first arrival at this port for many months from Russia—where the Americans are treated with great respect. Left there the Residence, of Bolton; Tyre, of Providence; Sally, of Salem, and a Portsmouth ship. The Financier, of Bolton, had passed up. The Olive Branch, of Salem, for London, was at Ellineur. Sept. 12, lat 43 22 long 40 50 spoke the Molly, Galls'ord, 28 days from Liverpool, for Philadelphia. Sept 19 lat 43 long 59 54 saw a brig, which was totally dismantled, except a piece of the fore-mast.

September 26. Arrived, brig Two-Brothers, Bradford, 35 days from St. Sebastian. Left there, drig Bee, Hanon, of Bolton; schr Charles, Foster, Gloucester; schr Roger, Williams, of Providence; brig Mary; brig Abigail, Matthews; ships Dispatch, Ward, Orlando, Smith; and Matilda Travice, all of New-York;—brigs Paragon, Hart; Amiable-Creok, Eldridge; and Minerva, Archy, all of Philadelphia; schr. Caroline, of Baltimore; capt Stone, of Norfolk, and ship Thomas, Higgins, of Charleston. A schr. from Philadelphia, arrived a few hours previous to Capt. B's sailing, loaded with cocoa, cotton and coffee—Markets dull for Americans and West India produce. Sept 21 lat 43 12 long 58 20 spoke brig Aurora, Bartlett, 39 days from Bilbao, for Plymouth.

Ship Franklin, Oxnard, from St. Sebastian, 59 days. Two days after sailing, the Franklin was taken by a Guernsey privateer, who took out all the hands, except the Captain, cook, steward and boy; and put on board 2 prize masters and 8 men, and ordered the vessel to the first port. In this situation the Capt remained 3 days in which time he matured a plan which had the desired effect, and he again resumed the command of his own vessel, and secured his new comrades safely in the hold, by a very spirited and gallant manoeuvre. They made many attempts to gain their liberty, which of course gave the Captain double fears, for 20 days, when fortunately in long 27 8 W. spoke ship Apollo, Samuel Thurston, 16 days from Liverpool, bound to Baltimore, who took 5 of them; proper care was taken of the others, who are now in the Franklin.

Arrived at the Quarantine, brig Polly, Waters, 30 days from St. Thomas. Schr. Sally, Swafey, Trin ty. (Mar.) 33 days. Left there, schr, Hannah, Hooper, of Marblehead. Arrived at Port Royal, Aug. 14, brig Swan, Lunt, from Newbury-Port, 34 days; brig Eagle Rollins, was ready to sail from St Pierre. The English Alexanderine, Aug. 4, recaptured brig Rambler, Bell, from Philadelphia, which was taken by a French privateer in lat 33, long. 70, Capt. Hastings arrived at Martinique, Aug. 14. Aug. 18, in the Sambreouffage, spoke the English pr. Duke of Kent, treated politely and accompanied through the passage. Aug 29, lat 30, long 70, spoke ship Aklajudith, Abbot, 11 days from St. Croix, for Boston.

Brig Betley, O'Case, for Boston; has been detained by the Spaniards at Valparaiso, demanded damage for detention, would not accept 300 dolls. and proceeded to Lima for redress.

NEW-YORK, October, 2.

Ship Jefferson, Cutter, of Portsmouth, (N. Y.) from Surinam. Left there the 9th of August under convoy of the U. S. ship Mary and capt Rodgers. Touched at Dominico, Martinique and St Thomas—Left the latter place the 9th of Sept with a fleet of about 65 sail of American vessels, bound to different ports of the U. States. Sept 14th, in lat 22 in a heavy sea carried away his foremast.

Capt C. takes this method of returning his thanks to Capt Rogers for the attention and assistance rendered him before and after his disaster. Left the following vessels at Surinam. Ship Liberty, of New-York; brig Franklin, of Peppere borough; Enterprize Langdon, of Portsmouth; Mary, Elles, of New-Haven.

Ship Olive Branch, Macey, 37 days Fayal, September 5th spoke British sloop Flirt. Sept 6th in lat 40 40 long 33 20 spoke schr Bilbao, Perkins, of and from Philadelphia to St Sebastian, out 19 days. 20th, in lat 41 53 long 56 9 fell in with two hogheads Tobacco, marked T. S. on the head, and several pieces of a wreck. 28th, was brought to by the British frigate Bolton, detained an hour, and treated politely. In the Olive Branch came passenger captain William Fairly of Dartmouth in Great Britain.

Schr Two Friends, Williams, 27 days Jamaica, sept. 26th spoke schr Nally, capt. Graham, off Cape Hatteras, from Bolton, who had put into Norfolk, having carried away both masts, &c. repaired damages there, and was then proceeding to Antigua, Sept 27th, spoke ship Washington, from Liverpool to Charleston, 46 days.

The brig Two Twins, capt. Scott, had failed 10 days before him for New York. Left there ship Favourite, Backhouse, to sail in 5 days for N. York: The schr. Silfers arrived at Jamaica 2 days before captain Williams failed. A gentleman who had arrived at Jamaica informed that the brig Neutrality was cast away on Turks-Island on her homeward bound passage.
