The following articles are from Jamaica papers.

Jamaica, Sept. 18. The American ship Eagle, from N. York, bound to Carracoa detained by His Majesty's ship Nereide, arrived on Tuesday evening.

We understand that information is received by an officer of his Majesty's ship Nereide sent on purpose that the marines from that vessel had landed on the island of Carracoa and had taken possession of two very strong places, which were surrendered to them without the least resistance.

September 19. In our paper of Yesterday we mentioned that information had been received of the Marines from the Nereide having taken possession of two places in Carracoa, we have since been able to learn the cause of it. Some time ago about 30 small vessels having French troops on board arrived at that Island from Guadaloupe to assist the banditti that had rebelled against their masters those

planter, who slaves had remained faithful to them; and were afraid of an attack from the insurgents requested as we are informed that two passes well fortified, but which they could not protect should be taken possession of by English Marines from the Nereide then Cruising off the coast which request the Captain humanely consented to protect them from the inroads of their barbarous enemy. The American ship Eagle sent in her by the Nereide has we understand on board several thousand stand of arms and a vast quantity of gunpowder which it is affirmed she was carrying to supply the rebels with. We understand that in consequence of advices received from Carracoa his Majesty's ships Maleagor, La Legere and another frigate sailed this morning for that Island with all the Marines belonging to the fleet.

PORT OF PHILADELPHIA.

SALEM, September 14. Arrived, the brig Washington, Willon, (late Captain Murphy) from Calcutta, in 5 months and four days.

September 15, arrived, the schooner Sauey, Captain Knifman, in four days from Halifax, where she had been sent in by the British frigate Cleopatra, on her homeward passage from the Havana, tried, and cleared. Arrived in Hampton Roads, the ship Union, Captain Hooper, 60 days from Hull, bound to Baltimore.

Spoke on the 3d instant, in latitude 38, longitude 60, brig West India, Captain Chisholm, from Charleston to London, out fourteen days.
