

GOVERNOR'S ADDRESS.

PENNSYLVANIA LEGISLATURE.

Yesterday afternoon the Governor met the two Houses in the Chamber of the House of Representatives, and delivered the following address:

Gentlemen of the Senate, and Gentlemen of the House of Representatives.

THE Legislature having omitted to prescribe the manner, in which the electors of a President and Vice-President of the United States, shall be appointed, I have thought it incumbent on me, to furnish the present opportunity, for discharging a trust, so interesting to the honor of the State, and so essential to the prosperity of the Union.

It is to be regretted, Gentlemen, that the difference of opinion, which occurred on this subject, between the two branches of the last General Assembly, has deprived our Constituents of an immediate participation in the choice of Electors, either by an election of the citizens at large, or by an election of the citizens in districts.

Nor can we resist the influence of those occurrences which admonish us, at this momentous period of human affairs, to rally round the Constitution of our Country, as the palladium of civil Liberty, and the last hope of Republican Virtue.

Though I have thus explicitly communicated my sentiments, and exonerated myself from all official responsibility, I still deeply partake of the general solicitude, for the issue of your deliberations. The situation of our Country is critical:

but not alarming. In her external relations, the prospect of reconciliation and peace appears, by recent intelligence, to be realized; and nothing seems wanting to her domestic happiness, but a recollection of the common interest, by which all her Citizens must be equally animated, in their efforts to promote it.

I shall reserve, Gentlemen, the communications on the general state of the Commonwealth for a future message: but I cannot conclude at this time, without assuring you of my most cordial co-operation, in every measure for the public good.

CHARLESTON, October 24. Votes for members of Congress, in Beaufort District.

Captain Hussey, the pilot, who was blown off on Saturday night last, in the schooner Highland Lass, capt. Brown, arrived in port last night. He informs us that he spoke the sloop Dove, capt. Lufcomb from Savannah, bound to this port, who had been blown off in the same gale; that capt. L. unable to get in here, and being short of provisions, and otherwise much in distress had resolved to bear for Wilmington, at which place it is probable he arrived here yesterday.

Capt. Littlefield, of the sloop Aurora, left the Havana on the 17th inst.—An embargo had existed for 26 days previous to this date, in consequence of three Spanish 74's and a frigate preparing to sail on a cruise: they left Havana a few days before capt Littlefield; but after being a short time at sea, returned; and in entering the port, one of the ships ran foul of a Baltimore schooner, and sunk her.—It was expected, when capt L. failed, that the embargo would again be laid on the next day.—No United States cruisers on the Havana station.

Mr. MICHAU, the botanist of the French Republic, who resided for a number of years in this State, in that capacity, we find is not to return here immediately, as the following extract of a letter is dated in Paris, on the 6th of August last.

"I have to inform you, that my father appears to have abandoned absolutely the idea of again seeing Carolina. He has taken a direction entirely opposed to a voyage to that country; and it is with grief I announce to you, that he is to embark on board of one of two vessels, which are destined for the South Seas. This expedition, the object of which is to make new discoveries, has been ordered by the First Consul, and the British government has granted passports for it. The national Institute has made a selection of learned men who are to accompany it, and my father is one; they are to depart by the 15th September, at the latest from Havre. Captain Baudin is to command the expedition. It is supposed they will be absent four or five years. My father expects to leave it at the Philippines, where the Squadron is to refit."
