THE COMMITTEE Appointed by the Merchants of this City, who are sufferers by British captures,

RECOMMEND.

THAT every Claimant who has not already exhibited well authenticated proofs of his property, furnish, without delay, proof that the property claimed is bona fide American, of its cost or value at the place of exportation, and at the place to which it was destined, (where that can be done) and the freight payable or customary, at the time of exportation, for like goods and voyages.

When the claim is for vessel, to specify the tonnage, age, where built, and the actual cost or value.

These documents ought to be proved by oath, or affirmation, of the party claiming, made and certified by a magistrate or notary public, and corroborated by such other testimony, as the nature of the case will admit.

Such of them as are handed to the Committee, will be forwarded to the Commissioners appointed on the part of the United States, to adjust the Claims of American Citizens.
