Exciting Times at Olyphant. Fraud Charged and the Counting of the Votes Stopped—Room Broken into by a Mob.

The election in Olyphant yesterday was the most exciting ever held in that borough. For an hour before the polls opened the voting places were thronged with a crowd which remained throughout the day.

In the Third ward the Republicans had a fusion with a portion of the Democrats, but the regular Democratic nominees were elected by majorities of from two to ten. The defeated candidates are going to contest the election.

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BURGLARS ARE ACTIVE

They Visited Five Places at Pine Brook Monday Night.

LEVI IS THE GREATEST LOSER

About \$300 Worth of Notions and Other Goods Taken from His Place. Brandenburg's Carpenter Tools Made Away With—Two Cellars Riddled—Daring Attempt to Burglarize Roos' Market—Many Petty Thefts Reported.

Burglars visited four houses at Pine Brook Monday night, and at each of them secured articles of value.

The greatest sufferer was Benjamin H. Levi, a peddler who resides at 1016 Capone avenue. An entrance was forced into the room where he kept his merchandise and about \$300 worth of notions, etc., taken.

David L. Brandenburg, a carpenter who resides at 235 Ash street, about half a block from Mr. Levi's place, was next visited. A chest containing his carpenter tools was on the stoop and the cracksmen spirited it away with them.

They carried it to the Delaware and Hudson railroad, a short distance away, and opened it under a freight car. The best of the tools were rejected and the rest abandoned. Yesterday morning the chest was discovered by men on their way to work. Tools were scattered about it for a distance of many yards.

TWO CELLARS ENTERED. Less than a block from Mr. Brandenburg's residence is a double frame building occupied by Mr. Wall and Mr. Butts. The burglars also paid their respects to that building. An entrance was forced into the cellars of both of the above named gentlemen and a cross-cut saw and a number of other articles stolen.

An attempt was made Monday night to enter the market on Pine street, near Washington avenue, of which S. Roos is the proprietor. There were four men in the party of burglars. The noise they made awoke Mr. George Brock, who occupies apartments over the market. She raised no alarm which awoke W. J. Burke, who occupies an adjoining house. Mr. Burke appeared on the scene with a revolver and Mrs. Brock grasping a revolver ran to the residence of Mr. Roos, a short distance away, and informed him of the bold attempt that had been made to despoil his market.

THE BURGLARS DEPART. By this time the burglars concluded there was too much excitement about Roos' market to suit them and they departed so hurriedly that they left behind a pile of mince-meat and an umbrella which had been stolen. In places they invaded.

Of late considerable petty thieving has been going on about the residence properties on the hill. Any article left lying about back doors is not of too little value to be taken. Brooms, shovels, clothes lines and numerous similar articles have been stolen. During Monday night a quantity of papers were taken from an ice chest, from which disappeared a coil of rope of lamb a short time previous. Scarcely a night passes without a raid by the thieves, and the people of the district on the hill would do well to take no risk of leaving anything accessible to these nocturnal marauders. It is only a question of time when their growing boldness will land them behind the bars and relief will follow.
