CARBONDALE, Pa., Feb. 28.—Shortly before 1 o'clock this morning the alarm sounded for a fire, which proved to be in the old Erie breaker, now leased and operated by Ira J. Meagley, of Binghamton. Soon the whole structure, which consisted of the old breaker and a new addition, which was recent built, was enveloped in uncontrollable flames. The fire companies were at the scene, but could do no good, the fire being out of the water district. The breaker was completely destroyed causing heavy damage to Mr. Meagley, who says he is partly covered with insurance. The fire will throw 112 hands out of employment.
