TOWN COUNCIL MEETING.

A Stormy Session in Which Each Member Participated. The town council held an adjourned meeting in the town hall last evening.

The meeting was called to order by President Mangano at 8:15 o'clock. Borough Treasurer Langan presented his report in the sum of \$40.00 for the consideration of the council.

A motion introduced by M. N. Donnelly to elect a sergeant at arms, whose duties would be to protect order at every meeting, at the rate of \$2 per meeting, created no little comment and was finally disposed of by laying it on the table.

The bond of High Constable Dempsey was presented and found to be properly attested to by Messrs. M. Dempsey and John Dempsey in the sum of \$500.

Permits to erect buildings were awarded on motion of Levi Koon, John Connell, T. F. Burke, of the Junction, asked permission to erect a two-story frame dwelling on North Main street, on what he termed the Barnum tract.

Messrs. Kennedy and Tighe were appointed a committee to employ a civil engineer and establish a grade for Ewan street. Messrs. Knowles, Kearney and Clifford were appointed a committee to confer with ex-Borough Treasurer Honser relative to the adjusting of such accounts as are in dispute between the auditors and Mr. Honser.

A resolution was carried empowering Burgess Maloney to notify the Strong estate to remove the rains of their building on South Main street within thirty days under a penalty.

The election of a janitor for the town hall for the ensuing year. The names of Mrs. Bannon, the present incumbent, and Mrs. McHale were balloted for, and resulted in a tie.

The propriety of establishing a board of health was touched upon but not definitely. The propriety of the proper course to be pursued in the matter of tax exonerating called forth a heated discussion between Messrs. Clifford, Hennigan, Tighe, Donnelly and Knowles.

O. N. W. John asked permission to erect a frame building 60x35 feet in size at the rear of the McDougall property on South Main street.

Attorney James L. Morris submitted an account of various judgments standing against the borough in the accounts of Auditors William Morris, Robert Armstrong and M. N. Donnelly for services rendered. It was referred to the finance committee for disposal.

Mr. Knowles moved that the councilmen for last year be paid their several amounts for their services—\$24 each. To this M. N. Donnelly forcibly objected by asserting that to do so would set some future time, perhaps, leave the council liable for voting away money which did not belong to it.

Orders were ordered drawn on the treasurer for the several bills outstanding.

Death of Mrs. Flanagan. Ross, wife of James Flanagan, of Market street, died at 9 o'clock yesterday morning, from the effects of a paralytic stroke, which she sustained at 8 o'clock last evening.


