Another Chance Made

Excelsior Athletic Club Persuaded to Conduct Association Tournament.

PLENTY OF ENTRIES ASSURED

Officers of Amateur Athletic Association of Athletics Promise Every Assistance to Make the Tournament a Success—Entries of Boxers and Wrestlers That Have Already Been Received by the Club.

The Excelsior Athletic club has made another change in the exercises under its auspices, held for April 9 and 10 at the Academy of Music. Last February the club decided to take charge of the fourth annual tournament of the Amateur Athletic Association of Athletics. Entry blanks were sent out to all the clubs of the association, and the affair was extensively publicized throughout the Eastern States.

For some unknown reason the officers of the Excelsior club did not seem to get much encouragement or assistance from the board of managers of the Athletic association, who were to receive half of the profit, and consequently the sentiment of the club's members was that the association tournament would be a fizzle, so they decided to drop the matter altogether.

As was stated in this column a week ago, the club intended to run a tournament of its own on the dates advertised for the association event, and put forth all its endeavor to make it eclipse all former tournaments.

ASSURED EVERY ENCOURAGEMENT. President Joseph J. McNally and Secretary John Collins left for Philadelphia last Wednesday to attend a meeting of the board of managers of the Athletic association and ask a release from the contract made in February. When the matter was brought up explanations were made by the members of the board that threw a different light on the subject.

The apparent non-interest on the part of the managers turned out to be without foundation. Instead Collins and McNally were assured and convinced that earnest cooperation was in progress for the success of the association tournament.

Assurances were given that several first class amateurs of the different clubs of the association had already begun training and would be on hand when the time came.

Why no answer came to Secretary Collins from over a hundred entries blank forwarded to the various clubs, and which aroused the idea that the association tournament would be unsuccessful, resolves itself satisfactorily when the explanation is given that the entries will not reach here until the men are ready to come along, too.
