THE ENEMY'S STRENGTH.

The theme ought to inspire us and we should profit by military experience and ascertain the strength of the enemy. Afterward let us make more of our own forces.

First, the liquor traffic is entrenched behind a vast physical appetite. Can we imagine the soldier who is accompanied by thirst? Of its power and pain we find many figurative lessons in the scripture...

We cannot know how the habit intensifies the thirst—we can only imagine it. It is a stone from a height; it falls first, then the next second, thirty-two feet the next and so on; a man who has become a victim hurries on his downward way to destruction at the same ratio.

The susceptibility of his being and his whole nervous force are so grooved and fixed that the slightest desire or temptation makes it impossible for him to resist the cup. We cannot estimate this susceptibility; its results are so abnormal, so extraordinary when compared to other physical appetites that we can scarcely comprehend them.

Again, this business is entrenched behind the love of money and a rampart of greed and avarice. If it could do, there are men who would locate a factory on the field of the battle of Gettysburg and grind the bleached bones of Union soldiers into phosphate, but this sacrifice would not compare with the exciting nearness of the liquor business.

Saloons are profitable. We have got to put ourselves against a vested interest, the large profits of which even enable them to pay in the larger cities a rental of \$50,000 where \$1,500 is a fair price for the same enterprise.

This suggests the recent financial depression. Some point to a free trade or a tariff, say create a seigniorage or vacuum. I am for the latter if it will "vacuum" the saloons, or for any or all of them if it will do the same thing.

The foe is entrenched in politics. The conducting of primaries, caucuses and the very nominations are infected with it and dictated by it.

We have a force in our public schools. The next army will be of the generation now in training. They get it to a large degree from the scientific books which make them rise and strike the blow when the time arrives for the demolition of the liquor business.

CITIZENS ARE AT FAULT. Will it astonish you when I say we all have a proprietary interest in the saloons, and are much responsible for their existence? We sold him that license and therefore we have a proprietorship. The saloon-keeper says his right license from the court; the court says the law authorized him to do so; the law was framed by legislators and the legislators were elected to office by the votes of so-called responsible men.

There is one remaining force on our side—the church. We ministers can do much. Get pledges from the boys, interest the Epworth and Young's leagues, press the older men to abstinence, and submit plain, everyday preaching. I would not scorn the plea of Scriptural custom and reverence. There is one argument almost invariably resorted to—the law of God's love. He loves for the sake of others. For the sake of example they will desert, not for what it costs them, but for the sake of others. On this point the pulpits must stand and make it a last and final appeal.
