FOX'S LIGHT SENTENCE

He Escaped With Three Years Imprisonment in the Penitentiary.

HIS WIFE WAS GIVEN ONE YEAR

She Will Spend It in the County Jail—Anthony Ferro Will Spend Five Years in the Penitentiary for Attempting to Kill Contractor Timothy Burke—Verdicts Taken and Sentences Imposed Saturday.

Saturday was sentence day in court and a number of convicted law breakers were given occasion to realize how true it is that "The way of the transgressor is hard." In Fox, who during the week pleaded guilty to the charge of having assaulted Clara Bixby, a 14-year old girl, was brought before Judge Archbald to receive sentence. When asked if he wished to address the court, Fox stood up with tears in his eyes and confessed his sorrow for what had happened, saying that he had always been a good man, and that he could not understand how he came to commit such a crime. He stated his desire to shield all responsibility for the sake of affording his wife, but declared that she wanted to share his punishment, to the end that they might not be separated.
