COURT HOUSE NEWS NOTES.

Twenty-three opinions were handed down by the judges yesterday. The hotel license of Mark J. Moran, of Providence, was yesterday transferred to Michael and James D. Gilbey.

In the case of D. W. Connelly and Michael Grimes against Albert Sherman O. B. Wright, Judge Edwards yesterday refused to grant a writ of mandamus.

Judge Archbald awarded a judgment of \$1,523.25 yesterday to the city in its suit against the German Cemetery association for paving and curbing on North Washington avenue.

In the case of the Delaware and Hudson Canal company against Augusta G. Genet, Judge Edwards said that it is a question of law that is in dispute and he therefore refused the request asking that an issue be framed.

Judge Archbald yesterday refused to strike off the compulsory non-suit in the case of Mrs. Margaret Macey against the Lackawanna Iron and Steel company. Mr. Macey was killed while employed repairing a pipe in a shaft at one of the defendant company's collieries.

At the request of the Central Pennsylvania Telephone and Supply company, Dr. D. B. Hand yesterday granted the particulars in his action against that company. He sued to recover damages for the death of his horse and personal injuries caused by coming in contact with a heavily charged telephone wire at Lackawanna avenue and Ninth street on Aug. 8, 1891.

Collins Will Get a New Trial. Henry Collins was yesterday granted a new trial in his action against the Carbondale Traction company. The case was tried several weeks ago and a compulsory non-suit granted on the ground that he should have brought his action against the city of Carbondale.

Case Against Breese Discharged. Judge Edwards yesterday discharged the proceedings against Samuel Breese, of this city, who is charged with deserting his children. They are living with his first wife from whom he has been divorced.

Miss Roseagle Will Not Get New Trial. The rule for a new trial in the case of Mary A. Roseagle against ex-Judge John Handly was discharged yesterday by Judge Edwards. He said he was unable to discover any substantial grounds for a new trial.
