Interview with the Rev. Abel J. Parry, the Eminent Welsh Clergyman.

Many facts of interest to the Welsh population of Scranton are contained in an interview by a TRIBUNE reporter with Rev. Abel J. Parry who is now visiting here. Mr. Parry is well known throughout Wales and to thousands of his countrymen here as a most eloquent orator and influential minister, author of high repute, a leading politician whose utterances have unusual weight and as one occupying the important position of president of the Liberalist society.

Before leaving Wales Mr. Parry was presented with a Welsh address wishing him God-speed across the Atlantic and a safe return home to the land of song. At the large gathering, when the presentation took place, so numerous were the tributes paid to the reverend gentleman that they leave no doubt that his Welsh admirers were anxious that they should not permanently lose his valuable services and counsel.

Questioned as to the impression made upon him by the various scenes and people of the new world, Mr. Parry said he was delighted to observe the progress of his countrymen in the Electric City, and was proud of the high and important positions held by representatives of his nation.

Mr. Parry is the son of a farmer, and was educated in the village of Llanidloes, in the county of Denbigh, North Wales. He is a member of the National Liberalist society, and has been a member of the National Liberalist society since its formation in 1880.

South Side Mill During Month of May Broke All Previous Records.

For the week ended May 12 the capacity of the Desanier department of the South works was greater than during any similar period since the construction of the mill, and the output of ingots for the month of May causes the statement that the record has once more been broken. Operating with two nine-ton vessels the mill has arrived at the remarkable record of blooming 23,875 tons of ingots. From May 1 to June 1 there has not been a single break in any part of the machinery and thus making a perfect month the management felt assured that it would be a record breaker.

It is not intended that no further effort will be made to improve on the present one. If no accidents occur in the current month there is an expectation that July 1 will be able to chronicle a notch higher.
