Pain Again Prevents Us From Advancing a Step Forward.

WE ARE STILL IN SIXTH PLACE

Scranton Has Not Materially Changed Its Position in the State League Championship, Although Winning Every Game It Played Last Week.

ITH the score standing 3 to 1 in Scranton's favor, the rain descended in torrents on Saturday afternoon, thus depriving our chances for the present at least, of advancing to fourth place in the State league championship race.

The only league game played was that between Reading and Allentown, in which the former quite readily won owing to the ineffectiveness of Allentown's pitcher.

Weather permitting, there will be a game this afternoon at Base Ball park between Harrisburg, the leaders in the League race, and Scranton, and a spirited and interesting contest will no doubt be the result.

The Pope company, of Boston, will run a Columbia special to Denver during the National bicycle meet.

George Barrett, of Chicago, did not win the time prize in the Chicago race after all. The reports sent out by the different press associations were tampered with.

The great tri-state (New York, Pennsylvania and New Jersey) relay bicycle race of 150 miles between New York and Philadelphia was run on Saturday under the management of the Atlanta Bicycle club.

Very few catches of black bass have been reported as yet. The streams are too high.

Arrangements have been made for a 300-mile cowboy race at Chadron, Neb., June 6, 7 and 8.

The spring trotting meeting of the Birmingham Driving Park association will be held at the track on July 12, 13 and 14.

George Chisnell, of Morea, is to run a road race of ten miles with P. J. Boyle, of Hazleton, June 4, on the road from Hazleton to Upper Lehigh. The match is for \$150 a side.

Harry Kimmel, of Montana, is desirous of engaging in a pigeon shooting match with John Lavelle, of Girardville, and will give him one dead bird out of every \$50 or \$100 a side. Match to be shot at Germantown.

"Joe" Choyinski has finally succeeded in securing a match with "Bob" Fitzsimmons. Parson Davies, his manager, has arranged a roundabout match to take place in Boston June 18. "Joe" Choyinski will probably enter the ring at 168 pounds.

The Olympic club will not increase their purse of \$1,000 and \$75 for a battle between Billy Britton and Chas. Kelly. If Pittman does not accept the offer will hold good for a meeting between James Tierney, the English boxer, and Kelly.

The Middle States Regatta association will hold its annual regatta on the Pasquo river on July 14. The regatta is under the management of the New England Amateur association, has been decided upon as referee, and James R. Doyle, of the Crescent Boat club, will act as time.

In Lavelle's basin, in Boston, three of the best yachts that have held America's cup in the international races lay side by side. They are the Puritan and Volunteer, who were successful in their attempts, and the Jubilee, who although beaten, made a bold bid for the honor.

Arrangements have been completed for a match race between Mascot, 2:04, and Saund, 2:05, for a purse of \$2,000 and an additional purse of \$500 if the record is broken. The races will occur at Belmont park. Saund has frequently been in the Providence track, and is a prime favorite in this city.

Pat Reedy, who claims to be the champion mile-weight pugilist of the south, wants to fight Dick Moore, of Minneapolis, or Paddy Cummings, of Maine, for \$1,000 a side and the largest purse the Olympic club of New Orleans will offer, at any time from four to six weeks from signing articles.

Peter Jackson, in a letter to the Police Gazette from San Francisco, says: "Please cable the National Sporting club that I accept their offer of \$3,000, and ask them to cable what date they want the contest, so that I can notify Charles E. Davies, my manager, and make arrangements to settle the matter in short order."

William Stettin, ex-champion of the world, has challenged Emanuel Lasker, the present champion, for an amateur match. He stipulates that the conditions in the main be similar to those which regulated their recent encounter, with the proviso that the only concession in the matter no later than the early part of December next.

Latest reports state that Jim Corbett has declined the offer of the National sporting club, of England, and that the fight with Peter Jackson will be held in America. George Weitz, of New York, has received a telegram from Corbett to this effect, and that he had decided to accept the \$100,000 offered by the Jacksonville Athletic club, of Florida.

The London Pall Mall Gazette prints an interview with the Canadian carmen, John J. Ryan and Joseph Wright, who are entered in Henley regatta, to be contested in July. Both express their admiration of the skill of the English women in sculling, but coming to the question of high class rowing, they are agreed in their opinion that the Canadian professional oarsmen are far superior to the English.

J. A. Hartwell, captain of the Yale crew of 1892, has arrived at New Haven and will coach the candidates for the "varsity" boat most of the time until after the Yale-Georgetown race on New London, S. R. Perry, captain of the Yale crew of 1893, is also coaching the Yale candidates at present. The coaches have been giving their attention to picking a couple of oarsmen from the freshmen boat for the varsity, in case the weakness of No. 4 is not remedied, but have not found the desirable material as yet. The crew will leave for New London next Saturday and occupy their quarters at the "Gales" Ferry. The date of the "varsity" race has been changed from Friday, June 22, to Thursday, June 23. The Harvard crew will leave Cambridge on June 9 for New London.
