According to ground rules Jennings was given a home run. Captain Miller, of the St. Louis, told Umpire Stage that he had not been notified of any such rules and would play the game out under protest.

Umpire Charlie Mitchell yesterday succeeded in signing Money, the Harrisburg catcher, for the Louisville club, paying \$500 for him. President E. K. Meyers paid out for \$1,000 but finally succeeded to the agent of Mitchell and Billy Parks, of Easton. Harrisburg has its eye on a new pitcher, who is said to be a wonder. It is whispered at Harrisburg that the State League's standard is not as healthy as it might be and things are shaky.—Allentown Chronicle.

It is to have a four club league composed of Reading, Scranton and Easton, and transfer the Harrisburg club to the last named city. How to Set the Table.

There is no fixed rule in regard to the laying of tables. The undercloth should be of thick cotton flannel, over which the tablecloth is smoothly spread. Each cover should have knives, forks and spoons and a tumbler. Saltcellars and butter plates, water carafes, pepper jugs, spoons of medium and large size, should form part of the table equipment. Small casters are sometimes used, very unobtrusive in appearance.

For the breakfast after the cloth is laid a neat cloth, embroidered in some simple design, is placed at the foot of the table. The cups, saucers, teapot, chocolate jug and coffee urn head the mistress' place at the board. At each cover is the knife and fork, with saltcellar and butter plate. There should be mats to match the meat cloth or tiles, which are generally used. A dish of fruit should be the decoration of the center.

For luncheons en famille the laying of the table is on the same principle as the breakfast, the menu differing.

A Whip That Cost \$1,500.

There is a curiosity that few are allowed to see. It is the whip that was presented to the late Mr. Vanderbilt when he broke the double team record with Maud S. and Aldine. It cost \$1,500. It has a handle of carved ivory of exquisite workmanship. There is a cameo of Commodore Vanderbilt and William H. Vanderbilt, a carving of the two horses as they break the record, and of a steamer and a railroad train. The whip is ornamented with gold, and is enclosed in a huge satin lined case.


