STOOD BY THE MAYOR His Action in Removing Police Officer Coslett Endorsed. ANOTHER POLE TAX ORDINANCE It Was Introduced by Mr. Roche Last Evening in Select Council and Provides That a Tax of Fifty Cents Be Levied on Each Pole and That They Be Painted a Dark Green Color. Other Business of Meeting.

Last night's meeting of select council was attended by President Chittenden and members Ross, Finn, Thomas, Williams, Roche, Durr, Wagner, Kellow, Clemens, Burns, Connell, Clark, Schwenk, Manley, Fellows, Westphal and Lauer.

Mayor Connell criticized. Mr. Manley appeared excited and in a turbulent state of mind when his name was reached in the polling. He said Mayor Connell had been high-handed and had removed Officer Coslett for political reasons.

Mr. Lauer remarked that Mayor Connell had not given a public reason for dismissing "Pete" in an injustice," he said, "to occur in the Mayor's action without a committee investigation, which would probably reveal that Coslett was removed for a cause that does not reflect upon his morals."

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HE IS STILL AT LARGE Murderer Medala Not Yet Apprehended, Although Hotly Pursued. INQUEST OF THE CORONER'S JURY Last Night Testimony Was Taken of Over a Score of Witnesses—The Italian Residents of Old Forge Are Very Reticent—The Search Yet Continues Without Effecting Up to a Late Hour Any Capture.

The inquest on the murder of Emanuel Loro last Sunday at Old Forge by Crincoza Medala was held last night at Edward Fallon's hotel at Old Forge. A more bloodthirsty or unscrupulous of human beings could hardly have gathered to the suffocating borders of the murdered man's countrymen who crowded around to be called in turn to give testimony before the jury.

GAY MR. LAWSON CAUGHT. He Was Brought to This City Last Night and Turned Over to the Police.

One of the smoothest and most successful all-round confidence men that ever operated in northeastern Pennsylvania was arrested at Stroudsburg yesterday and brought to this city last night. To this instance belongs mainly, if not all, the credit for his being brought to justice.

IMPORTANT TESTIMONY. John Harvey, who owns a stable close by the scene, went to feed his horse at 11 o'clock, but he did not see the man with whom the murderer was boarded next heard. He said that Medala always carried a pistol, but he did not know whether he carried it with him on Sunday. He heard the shots about 5 o'clock in the evening and saw the man who fired them run into the house of Joseph Salvi.

THE SHERIFF'S SEARCH. All of yesterday Sheriff Fabey, County Detective Siba, an Italian of Old Forge, who was acting as guide and who is acquainted with the murderer, and Edward Barrett, of Pittston, scoured the hills along the Mountain Valley road in quest of Medala.

It was found out that the capture was not made. However, the guard is kept up at points throughout the valley and it is believed that before long the murderer will be captured. It is said that a reward of \$500 will be offered today by the commissioners of Lackawanna county.

LATER—Well authenticated rumor this morning has it that Medala's hiding place has been discovered by the authorities and that he will be placed under arrest today. At 2 o'clock this morning County Detective Shea was interviewed at his home. He had just returned from the scene of the murder. He denied that Medala had been captured, but his answers were of a very evasive character. His manner would indicate that he has a positive clue as to the murderer's hiding place.
