MUST FIRST DEFEAT CORNELL

That is What Yale Must Do Before It Can Row Oxford.

For a number of years Cornell has been making every fair and sportsmanlike effort to bring about a race between her crew and Yale, but the New Haven men have off and on every excuse imaginable whenever the subject was mentioned by the officers of the Cornell navy, and have never until this year given them any satisfaction or assurance which might be construed in the least degree favorable to such an arrangement.

When Cornell, in 1875, won the intercollegiate regatta, defeating Yale, along with twelve other competitors, the New Haven men withdrew from the association, and said to Cornell: "Our policy is only to row Harvard."

Yale is very desirous of rowing Oxford, and to that end the Yale athletic team is going over as a sort of a forerunner to this greater international intercollegiate regatta. The most important feature of the proposed race between Oxford and Yale is this: The former has written to Cornell, which letter Commodore Brown has in his pocket, saying that Oxford will never row Yale until the New Haven crew defeats Cornell or any other worthy claimant to intercollegiate aquatic championship honors in America.

She realizes that Yale is a power in rowing, but she is also aware that Cornell has a record of eleven years' uninterrupted victories in eight-oared shells. She knows that Courtney has never coached a losing crew, and that with Cornell making such open and manly propositions to Yale as she has for years that it would be an empty honor for any English crew to row Yale, and even if the Englishmen won they are too sportsmanlike to give the affair an international character by a great rowing college like Cornell left behind over in America, unvanquished but yet undefeated.

Just what Yale will do, now that she has received her ultimatum from Oxford, is an unanswered question. That she wants to test her skill with the Englishmen is acknowledged by Captain Cook, but now what the only way for her to accomplish this is to first defeat Cornell, places the New Haven university in a position that she is not used to, one of being dictated to, and just how she will conduct herself under this drawn rein is a matter of great speculation. The question that sportsmen ask of each other is, "Why should Yale row Cornell?" Every non-partisan who saw Saturday's race believes Cornell is the fastest crew in the world. Every man who ever sat in a good Yale crew knows that Yale has nothing to accomplish in rowing Harvard, for the latter has not much of a rowing reputation.
