DARING JAIL DELIVERY.

It is Now Believed That the Four Liberated Prisoners Had Assistance from the Outside.

HONESDALE, Pa., July 22.

Four prisoners, Dennis O'Donnell, John Fitzpatrick, Thomas Connell and Albert Fletcher, broke out of the county jail Friday night and made their escape.

Prisoners are allowed free use of the corridor, and this fact is due their escape. There must have been outside help, as the bars are neatly sawed into and indicate more than one day's work.

To crawl down this small hole and down the outside was a difficult piece of work. A fence fourteen or fifteen feet high surrounds the jail, but this is easily mounted.

Thomas Connell is about 5 feet 4 inches tall, slight mustache, dark hair, 40 years old. He is suspected of being connected with the murder of Groceryman Henderson at Newburg.

Dennis O'Donnell, 5 feet 5 inches tall, stout, smooth face, light hair, 30 years old, was arrested for stealing a horse at Ketchell. John Fitzpatrick, nearly 6 feet tall, slim, hair partly gray, light complexion, 45 years old, was arrested for stealing a watch at Starucca.

OUR MILITARY LETTER Critic Pays a Deserved Tribute to the Worth of Lieutenant Madison.

COLONEL E. H. RIPPLE'S ORDER

It Reviews the Officer's Military Career—Company B and the Officers of the Thirtieth Regiment Will Take Part in the Funeral. Progress That Has Been Made in Qualifying Marksmen—Other Notes.

In the death of Harman (better known as Harry R. Madison, the Thirtieth regiment has lost one of its brightest gems. He had been identified with the regiment since its organization, Aug. 14, 1877.

As a non-commissioned and commissioned officer he never shirked a duty, cheerfully obeying all orders of his superiors. The regiment has never been formed for drill, parade, inspection, camp or active service but what he was present.

He was the ranking first lieutenant in the National Guard of Pennsylvania and an officer of excellent ability. The state will never possess a more faithful sergeant, nor the regiment a more affable, courteous, gentlemanly officer.
