REVOLVER IS MISSING

Coroner's Inquest in the Givinsky Case Had to Be Postponed. EVIDENTLY FEARS THAT HIS OWNERSHIP OF THE WEAPON MAY CAUSE HIM TROUBLE—CORONER KELLY WENT TO ARCHBOLD YESTERDAY AND EMPANELLED A JURY AND HEARD SOME EVIDENCE. WILL MEET AGAIN ON THURSDAY.

Coroner Kelly went to Archbold yesterday afternoon to investigate the shooting affray of Monday evening at the Ridge, by which Edward Givinsky lost his life. He empanelled a jury composed of Thomas Manley, Solomon Middleman, L. A. Biele, W. W. Donaher, Dr. J. B. Grover and T. H. Seanon and proceeded to the place where the shooting occurred.
