MR. DIDDLEBOCK SAID HE TRIED every way to secure the admission of the reporters but it was not allowed.

DIDDLEBOCK ON DECK

He Brings Along His Little Red Book and Reads Law for Scrantonians.

STATE LEAGUE IN SESSION HERE

After Telling Scranton How Wicked It Has Been and Subjecting the Association to a Severe Scolding from King Kelly, the State League People Proceed to Soothe Scranton's Sores by Rearranging the Percentage Basis—Other Doings in Base Ball.

Pursuant to a call of Secretary Diddlebock, the State League held a meeting at the Wyoming House last night. The main object of the meeting was to discourage, or by bluff or bluster, or compromise, prevent the Scranton club from going into the Eastern League.

Secretary Diddlebock was early on the scene and with that persuasive argumentative ability, of which he has no surfeit, he convinced the Scranton association that in proceeding as they had done to enter the Eastern League they had subjected themselves to well-nigh certain short of hanging or imprisonment for life.

It was nearly 10:30 when the league managers filed into parlor B in the Wyoming although the meeting of that body had been called for 8 o'clock. The delay was occasioned by the absence of the Philadelphia representative who did not arrive until 10:05.

MR. DIDDLEBOCK, WHEN SEEN BY A TRIBUNE reporter concerning the Eastern League, said: "I never was asked about this affair in Scranton. I know that if the National agreement was lived up to that Scranton could not desert the State League and join the Eastern League. That matter is clearly covered by Section 5 [B] of the National agreement."

MR. SANDERS, OF THE TRUTH, WAS among those who were kept on the outside of the meeting room for a time. Mr. Sanders was very anxious to get inside. He has a grievance against Mr. Diddlebock and he wanted to air it before the meeting.

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BATTLE OF GETTYSBURG

Rev. Dr. Logan Described It for the Benefit of the Soldier Boys.

ADDRESS WAS ILLUSTRATED.

By Means of a Stereopticon, Maps Were Shown from Which the Speaker Pointed Out the Exact Position of the Different Bodies of Troops That Participated in That Terrible Engagement.

"I would like to do justice to the commanders and the soldiers who had a part in that wonderful battle of Gettysburg, the turning point of the rebellion, but it is impossible for me to do so in the necessarily brief space of time at my disposal tonight."

HE IS LAID AT REST. Funeral of Owen Cusick a Very Large One—Services at St. Peter's Cathedral.

The last look on the mortal remains of Owen Cusick at 9 o'clock yesterday was reluctantly taken by the family and friends and the funeral cortege proceeded slowly to St. Peter's cathedral.
