OUR OWN FLANAGHAN DID IT

Rain and Wet Grounds Prevented the Allentown-Harrisburg and Pottsville-Hazleton Game—The Poor Phillips Lose Again to Lancaster. Standing of the Clubs—National and Eastern League Summaries—Various Base Ball, Bicycle, Turf and General Sporting News.

AREWELL to the State League Scranton yesterday celebrated the retirement from the State League of Base Ball clubs by winning the second of the scheduled games with Reading in a brilliant manner, with Flanagan.

who by this time is an Eastern league twirler, in the box, Torreyson's men being able to secure but six hits off his delivery. The home team thus leaves the state organization as its leader, being sixty-eight points ahead of the Allentown contingent of "have-beens," who hold second place.

The other State league game played was that between Lancaster and Philadelphia, in which the former won with ease. The Hazleton-Pottsville game was postponed on account of wet grounds and in the Allentown-Harrisburg game rain prevented its being played. The only change in the standing of the clubs is the dropping of Reading to a tie with Hazleton for fifth place.

GOOD-BYE DIDDLEBOCK

Scranton is Now a Member of the Eastern League.

WE MEET SPRINGFIELD TODAY

After Yesterday's Game at Reading the Scranton Club Disbanded and the Players Signed Eastern League Contracts After the Club Had Been Formally Admitted into That Organization—Three of the Troy Players Signed.

Today at Springfield, Mass., the Scranton will play its first game in the Eastern League. Secretary Betts, of the Scranton club, Stockholder A. L. Francois and President Powers, of the Eastern league, were in Reading yesterday and after the State league game was over the Scranton club disbanded, threw up its State league franchise and was afterwards admitted to the Eastern league.

The work of signing the players in the Eastern league was then taken up and all of the men attached their names to contracts except Hogan, Yerkes and Hobson. Hogan goes to Cincinnati at \$400 a month, Hobson to Boston at \$325 a month, and Yerkes to Shenandoah.

THREE TROY MEN SIGNED. Three members of the defunct Troy team have been signed by Scranton and will probably play in today's game. There is also a probability that Pitcher Delaney, of Banghamton, will be purchased. Manager Swift's future connection with the club is somewhat in doubt.

Some of the local stockholders say that Cahill, of the Troy club, will be manager, while others assert that Mr. Swift will continue at the helm.

The desertion of the State league by Scranton will give Shenandoah its long looked for opportunity to place a club in that organization. It is probable that there will be another break in the State league before long, as Reading is slated to leave Banghamton's place in case that club decides to retire from the base ball arena.

Scranton will play in Springfield today and tomorrow and then return to this city. Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, Providence will play at the ball park in this city, and Thursday, Friday and Saturday Scranton and Springfield will contest at the same place. On Aug. 20, 21 and 22 Scranton is scheduled to play in Wilkes-Barre and on Aug. 23, 24 and 25 Wilkes-Barre is scheduled to play in Scranton. It is probable that an arrangement will be made by which the games will be played in the two cities on alternating days.

As to the State league Scranton can say farewell, a long farewell.
