Closing Down on Anarchists.

The fact that the senate has passed and the house committee on judiciary favorably reported Senator Hill's bill for the exclusion and deportation of alien anarchists receives attention to a measure which it is said will supersede the Stone immigration bill and be the only legislation of the session bearing on the question of the closer supervision of alien newcomers.

The superintendent of immigration is given power to investigate the record and reputation of any alien anarchist who may already be in this country, and shall have him conveyed to the port of departure and returned to the country from whence he came.

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
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
