THIS TIME WE WON.

Delaney, Our New Pitcher, Made a Favorable Impression.

There were sounds of revelry in the grand stand as Dan Shannon's band of heroic athletes came down with several kinds of dull tunes to the slow music of the Midway Pleasure orchestra, occupying an elevated position on the ninth floor of the aforesaid grand stand.

The victory yesterday over Wilkes-Barre at the ball park was a dambounded when it was all over that he forgot to say a word, so that it will be seen that the surprise was great indeed.

But then Wilkes-Barre was easy yesterday. Maybe Shannon, out of pure commiseration on suffering Scranton, took his men over to Dillay Wednesday night to celebrate the victory, or it may be perchance that association with Cahill's men has been injurious. At all events, true it is that there was a distinct flavor of "has been" about the work of Wilkes-Barre.

We will not quarrel with Shannon's men on that score, however, for it gave us a game, which is something to be thankful for.

PLAYED BETTER BALL. Cahill's braves played in much better form than on Tuesday. He seemed to have inoculated his men with some of his own personality and they played the game as though they had a well defined idea of what they were on earth for. Scranton was stronger in the pitching department, two than it was on Tuesday. Delaney made his first appearance and won favor from the start. He is cool and heady and in some respects reminds the spectator strongly of Hodson. He was found twelve times yesterday as follows: Home run, one triple, three doubles and seven singles. He gave two men bases on balls, a hit two and struck out six men. He kept the hits fairly well scattered and at critical moments was cool and effective.

DELANEY GOES TO WORK. Right at this point is where Mr. Delaney began to declare himself. When Gillen presented himself at the plate Delaney gave several hitches to his trousers, a la Flanagan, and went to work. Gillen flung the air three and retired to the bench to give Warner a chance. Warner, by the way, is the tall dark-brown young man who punished Mr. Donovan so unmercifully at Wilkes-Barre on the previous day.

Well, Mr. Warner spat upon his hands and rubbed them in the portion of the United States about his well developed feet and after hammering his home plate a little deeper into the earth with his bat was satisfied that there was no flaw in that particular willow, so he in turn gave a hitch to his trousers and directed toward Mr. Delaney a look that meant "come on," if it meant anything. The ex-Parlor City boy didn't seem, but the ball did. In fact it came in several times in an erratic way that greatly perturbed Mr. Warner. After three unsuccessful reaches for it he, too, gave it up in disgust.

The power of Delaney's strong right arm had been vindicated and the day saved for Scranton.

WHAT CAMPFIELD DID. Campfield, the slender youth, whom Wilkes-Barre once upon a time allowed to come to this city but afterwards recalled, officiated in the pitching box for the visitors and was only a trifle less effective than Delaney. Scranton had ten men left on bases while Wilkes-Barre had but four.

Rogers went behind the bat at the beginning of the game, but injured one of his fingers in the first inning and had to retire, Patchen taking his place. In the fifth inning Whitehead was taken sick and had to leave the ground, whereupon Cahill sent Philan in front of the bat to cover third and put Rogers in right. The score:
