

GENERAL NEWS OF INDUSTRIES

The annual report of General Manager James M. Swan, of the American Iron and Steel Association, which has just been completed and will be presented to the members of the association during the next few days, is especially interesting from the fact that it deals with a period of the lowest prices for iron and steel products ever before known in the history of the trade.

The production of coal of all kinds in the United States in 1893 was 162,814,977 gross tons, against 160,115,243 tons in 1892.

The production of Bessemer steel ingots in 1893 was 3,215,986 gross tons, against 4,168,495 tons in 1892, and 3,247,417 tons in 1891.

The production of open-hearth steel ingots in 1893 was 737,990 gross tons, against 669,889 tons in 1892, an increase of 68,001 tons, or over 10 per cent.
