PIRE, MILL AND RAILROAD.

Pittsburg advances from a source evidently hostile to the Carnegies assert that steel rails have been sold for months by members of the steel rail pool at prices considerably below the list on a ton basis.

The rate cutting of the steel rail pool has been confined principally to the west and southwest. In the market along the eastern seaboard and in the northeast the \$24 rate of the pool has been pretty well maintained.

In the opinion of John H. Martin, an observant ex-railroader who now travels at the head of a leading theatrical organization, the most serious threat to the passenger departments of the railroads have now to contend with is the trolley systems, which promise to make serious inroads into their short travel and suburban business.
