KANSAS.

Topeka, Nov. 6.—Kansas elected a governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, auditor general, attorney general, treasurer, superintendent of public instruction, for terms of two years; associate justice of the supreme court, eight congressmen, a legislature, which will elect a successor to United States Senator John Martin (Dem.-Pop.), whose term expires March 4, 1895.

MICHIGAN.

Lansing, Nov. 6.—Michigan elected a governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, treasurer, auditor, attorney general, land commissioner, superintendent of public instruction, for terms of two years; members of the state board of education, twelve congressmen, a new legislature, which will elect a successor to United States Senator James McMillan (Rep.), whose term expires March 4, 1895, and one to succeed the late Francis B. Stockbridge (Rep.), whose term expires in 1892. The vote of the state for president in 1892 was: Democratic-Populist, 103,111; Republican, 157,341; Prohibition, 4,588.

KENTUCKY.

Frankfort, Nov. 6.—Kentucky elected four judges of the court of appeals, eleven congressmen, a legislature, which will elect a successor to United States Senator John M. Stewart (Rep.), whose term expires March 4, 1895, and one to succeed the late Francis B. Stockbridge (Rep.), whose term expires in 1892. The vote of the state for president in 1892 was: Democratic-Populist, 135,461; Republican, 157,341; Prohibition, 4,588.

LOUISIANA.

Baton Rouge, Nov. 6.—Louisiana elected six congressmen, a legislature, which will not be held until April, 1895. The congressional candidates were: First district—H. P. Boston, Nov. 6.—Massachusetts elected a governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, treasurer, auditor, attorney general, for terms of one year; seven members of the executive council; thirteen congressmen, and a legislature, which will elect a successor to United States Senator George F. Hoar, whose term expires March 4, 1895. The candidates for governor were John E. Russell, D.; Frederick T. Greenhalge, present incumbent, R.; George H. Cary, P.; Alfred Wells Richardson, P.; David Taylor, S. The vote of the state for president in 1892 was: Democratic, 126,995; Republican, 126,035; Prohibition, 3,556; Socialist-Labor, 4,882.

The people also voted upon a proposed amendment to the constitution of the state extending the franchise to the suffrage to women. The candidates for governor were: David Overmyer, D.; Edmund N. Morrill, R.; George W. C. Picking, P. The vote of Kansas for president in 1892 was: Democratic-Populist, 103,111; Republican, 157,341; Prohibition, 4,588.

St. Paul, Nov. 6.—Minnesota elected a governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, treasurer, for terms of two years; auditor, for a term of four years; chief justice and associate justice of the supreme court, for terms of six years; seven congressmen, and a legislature, which will elect a successor to United States Senator W. D. Washburn (Rep.), whose term expires March 4, 1895. The candidates for governor were: Francis M. Becker, D.; Knute Nelson, present incumbent, R.; Sidney M. Owen, P.; H. S. Miller, P. The vote of the state for president in 1892 was: Democratic, 103,111; Republican, 157,341; Prohibition, 4,588.

MISSISSIPPI.

Jackson, Nov. 6.—Mississippi elected seven congressmen. The first general election under the new constitution will be held in November, 1895. The congressional candidates were: First district—Richard A. H. Williams, R.; Second—John C. Kyle, D.; M. A. Montgomery, R.; R. N. W. Boynton, P.; Robert J. Hattfield, P.; Seventh—A. N. Jefferson City, Nov. 6.—Missouri elected a Supreme Court Judge, Railroad Commissioner, for term of six years; Superintendent of Public Instruction, for a term of four years; fifteen congressmen, half the members of the State Senate, and all the members of the Assembly. The candidates for judge were: Francis Marion Black, Democrat; Walter M. Robinson, Republican; Orville D. Jones, Populist; R. B. Robinson, Prohibition; Albert E. Sanderson, Socialist-Labor. The vote of the State for president in 1892 was: Democratic, 126,995; Republican, 126,035; Prohibition, 3,556; Socialist-Labor, 4,882.

NEW JERSEY.

Trenton, Nov. 6.—New Jersey elected eight congressmen, eight State Senators, and a new legislature, which will elect a successor to United States Senator John E. McPherson, (Dem.), whose term expires March 4, 1895. The Legislature also elects a Controller and Treasurer.

NORTH CAROLINA.

Raleigh, Nov. 6.—North Carolina elected a Chief Justice and three Associate Justices of the Supreme Court; 111 the unexpired terms, eight Superior Court Judges, 121 congressmen, twelve Solicitors of Judicial Districts for terms of four years; fifty State Senators, and one hundred and twenty members of the Assembly. The Legislature will elect a successor to United States Senator M. W. Ransom, (Dem.), whose term expires March 4, 1895, and a United States Senator to fill the term of the late Z. B. Vance, (Dem.), which ends March 4, 1895.

NORTH DAKOTA.

Bismarck, Nov. 6.—North Dakota elected a Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, Auditor, Treasurer, Attorney General, Superintendent of Public Instruction, Commissioner of Agriculture and Labor, Commissioner of Insurance, Public Examiner, and a legislature, for three Railroad Commissioners for terms of two years, Chief Justice of Supreme Court for a term of six years, one Congressman. It also voted upon a proposed amendment to the constitution of the state, which provided for the sale of lottery or gift-enterprise tickets.

Helena, Nov. 6.—Montana elected a congressman, half the members of the State Senate, and all the members of the Assembly. The Legislature will elect a successor to United States Senator Thomas L. Bacon, (Rep.), and a United States Senator to fill a vacancy caused by the failure of the late Legislature to elect. The people were also to decide by their vote which city, Helena or Anaconda, should be the permanent state capital. Candidates for Justice were: L. A. Luce, Democrat; William H. Hunt, Rep.; George W. Reeves, Populist. The vote of the state for president in 1892 was: Democratic, 12,981; Republican, 18,561; Prohibition, 59. The state for congress were: First—Francis S. Hartman, R.; Robert B. Smith, P.; Hal S. Corbett, D.

NEBRASKA.

Lincoln, Nov. 6.—Nebraska elected a Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, Controller, Treasurer, Attorney General, Superintendent of Public Instruction, Railroad Commissioner, and a legislature, for terms of four years; Justice of the Supreme Court, for a term of six years; four District Judges for terms of four years; nine State Senators, and a new Assessor. The candidates for Governor were: Charles F. Manderson, Republican; The candidates for Governor were: D. Henry F. Wood, Democrat; Silas A. Holcomb, Democratic-Populist; Thomas J. Major, Republican; E. A. Gardner, Prohibition. The vote of the state for president in 1892 was: Democratic, 21,541; Republican, 87,213; Prohibition, 14,927.

NEVADA.

Carson City, Nov. 6.—Nevada elected State officers for four years and the Legislature, and voted upon 25 proposed amendments to the constitution of the State, chief among which were sections consolidating certain State offices, authorizing the investment of the monies in other than United States and Nevada bonds, and retaining amnesty to persons who, after residing in Nevada for one year, bear arms against the United States. The candidates for Governor were: P. P. Keating, Democrat; Thomas Wheeler, Democrat; A. C. Cleveland, Republican; George Beckham, Populist, and John E. Jones, Silver. The vote of the state for president in 1892 was: Democratic, 711; Republican, 2,822; Prohibition, 7,267; Prohibition, 1,267.

NEW HAMPSHIRE.

Concord, Nov. 6.—New Hampshire elected a governor, for terms of two years; two Congressmen, and a Legislature, which will elect a successor to United States Senator William E. Chandler, R. The Legislature also elects a Secretary of State, Treasurer, and Printer. The people also voted upon the proposition of calling a convention to revise the constitution of the State. The candidates for Governor were: Charles A. Busiel, Republican; George D. Epp, Populist; and Daniel C. Knowles, Prohibition. The vote of the state for president in 1892 was: Democratic, 42,681; Republican, 45,653; Prohibition, 202; Prohibition, 1,267.
