All of the Water Companies absorbed by the Scranton Water Company Reorganized.
All the twenty-six water companies between this city and Nanticoke which have been absorbed by the big syndicate, the Spring Brook Water and Supply company, have been reorganized and the leases ratified.
The reorganization of the Wilkes-Barre Water company took place at the office on West Market street yesterday. A. H. McPherson, retired president and Lemuel Amerman, of this city, was elected in his place. Other officers elected were: B. M. Epsy, secretary and treasurer; directors, ex-Lieutenant Governor L. A. Ward, C. D. Simpson, Thomas H. Watkins, Robert C. Adams and J. Rogers Maxwell.
The Crystal Spring and Spring Brook Water companies were reorganized in New York Wednesday. Rogers Maxwell, who was the former president, was re-elected president of the Crystal Spring company, he being interested in the new deal. Of the Spring Brook C. D. Simpson was also re-elected president, he also being interested in the new company.

AN APPEAL TO THE LAW

Action That Has Been Taken by Olyphant Borough Councilmen.

WRIT OF QUO WARRANTO ASKED
