M'KINLEY'S DAYS OF GOOD CHEER

Tidings of Encouragement Are Brought in Every Mail.

SILVER SENTIMENT ON THE WANE

Communications from Men of Intelligence Throughout the Land Indicate That the Natural Reaction Is Beginning to Set In—Hearty Indorsement on All Sides.

Canton, Ohio, Aug. 5.—This has been a day of good cheer for Major McKinley. Seated comfortably at home in the cool of a darkened study, he has spent the hours reading a mail that was laden with tidings of hope and encouragement. He had letters from men of intelligence in all parts of the country and the tenor of their communications was that the free silver sentiment has reached its greatest point of development and that the natural reaction is beginning to set in.

COCKRAN VERSUS BRYAN.
