

SCHOOL BOARD HAS A DEEP SYMPATHY

Superintendent Howell Retired from Supervision of the High School.

HE HAS TOO MUCH OTHER WORK

So Says the Committee in Giving Its Reason for This Action—Mr. Howell and His Adherents Say That There is Another Cause—Project Said to Be Illegal by Superintendent—He Has Dr. Schaeffer's Opinion to Back Him Up.

At the meeting of the board of control last night a movement was projected to deprive Mr. Howell of the supervision of the high school. When last night's special meeting was suggested, it was given out that the session would be for the purpose of removing Mr. Howell from his position as superintendent of the high school.

In view of a large increase in the attendance at the public schools of this city and the consequent increase in the teaching force, which has multiplied the work of our superintendent to such an extent as to require an assistant in his department, it is suggested that the new high school has shown an attendance in that department of our schools much larger than that of any other school.

MR. WILLIAMS QUOTES LAW

Mr. O'Malley moved the adoption of the report of the committee. As a result of the motion, Mr. Williams called the attention of the board to the following extract from the act of June 28, 1895: "The high schools established in accordance with this act of assembly shall be under the supervision of the superintendent of the city, township or county in which they are situated."

Mr. Carson moved to lay Mr. O'Malley's motion on the table, but the board refused. The motion to adopt was then put and carried by the following vote: Ayes—Mitchell, Francon, O'Malley, Warner, Welsh, Schaeffer, Conrad, Jacobs, Barker, Carson, Casey, Walsh, Williams, Langan—12.

OTHER DOINGS OF BOARD

As to the night school teachers, Mr. Barker made a recommendation that the respective controllers together with the teachers' committee make up an account of the night school for the next meeting. This was adopted. The building committee, through Mr. Jacobs, reported that the plans for the new building No. 28 had been approved and that the committee wanted authority to advertise for the heating.

GIVE A HANDSOME BANNER

Coal Miners from This Vicinity Made a Big Hit in New York

In one of the show windows of McCann & Connell's jewelry store, on Wyoming avenue is displayed the banner carried at the head of the coal trade division in Saturday's big parade in New York. It was brought here by the miners of the Hillsdale Coal and Iron company, who headed that division, and to whom it was presented by the Coal Trade Sound Money club for excellence in its appearance and sentiment.

Captain W. A. May, general manager of the Hillsdale company, is highly pleased over the hit the miners made. He said that before going down and marching with them in the procession, all along the line they were given the kindest kind of an ovation, and at the point where the marching was so terrific that the music of the band in front of them was drowned. Here upon some of the clippings from the New York Herald, the banner brought home with him.

They were cheered again and again, and when they reached the city and children ran out and offered them many of which were caught up and carried by the crowd.
