PRICE FOR MINING.

From 67 to 73 cents per ton, of coal
mined is paid employees and a widely
varied rate per yard. The coal is
weighed by a company employe, a
weighmaster. A miner averages from
four to six cars per day, a ton and a
half of coal per car. The laborers are
paid by the miners. Miners earn
from \$2.75 to \$3 per day. The sched-
ule paid the miners and by the latter
to laborers would be forwarded to the
company at Harrisburg.
