CONTROLLERS HAD A BUSY EVENING

Appointed Teachers and Janitors, and Ordered Many New Desks.

COMMITTEE COULD NOT AGREE

So the Board Relieved It of the Necessity of Passing Finally Upon the Matter of Ordering New Desks, and Also of Fixing the Salaries of Janitors—Bills for Text Books That Will Not Be Paid—The Reason Given by President Jennings.

It required a little over two hours last night for the board of control to approve the appointment of teachers and janitors for 1897-8, as recommended by the committee, to let some big contracts for school desks, to reorganize the high school salary list and to debate allied questions. When the meeting terminated the only order of business that had been considered was that including having passed a satisfactory examination in the entrance examination upon Professor Phillips, and all special pupils shall be permitted to enter the high school by a certificate issued by the superintendent and obtained at his office two weeks previous to the time of opening school.

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The high and training school committee recommended that salaries for the next school years be as follows:

TRAINING SCHOOL. Mary E. Sykes, prin. \$1,200. Mr. Williams offered a minority recommendation that the only change in salary be that of Mr. Loomis and that it be as recommended in the majority report.

TRAINING SCHOOL RULES. The following rules and regulations as recommended by the high and training committee were adopted: All pupils having passed a satisfactory examination in the grammar grade, all pupils having passed a satisfactory examination in the entrance examination upon Professor Phillips, and all special pupils shall be permitted to enter the high school by a certificate issued by the superintendent and obtained at his office two weeks previous to the time of opening school.

No pupil shall be allowed to change the course of study elected during the year, and under no circumstances shall a pupil in the high school be allowed to take a mixed course.

No pupil in the high school shall be permitted to receive a certificate to enter the high school by a certificate issued by the superintendent and obtained at his office two weeks previous to the time of opening school.

Whenever the programs can be so adjusted, the teachers, not the pupils, shall pass from class room to class room at the close of each period.

The principal of the high school shall designate one of the subordinate teachers to be approved by the high and training committee to do the clerical work of the high school, relieving the principal of his duty at least three hours class instruction each day.

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BRAKEMAN'S NECK BROKEN.

At 3.30 yesterday afternoon the axle of a freight car near the front of the Lehigh Valley cut-off, towards Avoca, broke and twenty loaded freight cars piled up.
