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The Romance of Governor Otero.

The New Executive of Mexico Was Once a Prisoner in the Santa Fe Jail—How He Got Sweet Revenge Upon His Persecutor.

When Miguel A. Otero, the newly-appointed governor of New Mexico, passed through Chicago the other day on his way west from Washington, he stopped to call upon William A. Vincent, and thereby hangs a tale.

To begin at the beginning, when General Grant returned from his famous trip around the world he was offered the position of president of a mining company, which claimed to own a mine, called by Americans the Big Copper, in New Mexico.

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
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
