TERRIBLE MURDER AT GOULDSBORO

Chilo Felker Shot and Killed Pretty Cora Gress, Aged Twenty Years.

HE WAS IN LOVE WITH THE GIRL. After Deserting His Wife and Child at Stroudsburg, He Went to Gouldsboro and Laid Siege to the Heart and Hand of His Cousin—Enraged at Her Refusal to Marry Him He Shot Her First with a Revolver and Then with a Shotgun.

Achilles, known as Chilo Felker, a married man, who has Indian blood in his veins, shot and killed 20-year-old Cora Gress, his cousin, at Gouldsboro, this county, yesterday. He loved the girl and upon her refusal to marry him the fiery nature of the man mastered him and he deliberately shot her first with a revolver and when she fell from the wound in her head, Felker fired a charge of buckshot from a double-barreled gun, the charge entering the body of the young woman. She died instantly.

Felker then attempted to shoot the mother of the girl, who witnessed the murder, but Mrs. Gress threw him to the floor before he could fire. The murderer, after a struggle, escaped and took to the woods. He is still at large.

The tragedy stands unique in local criminal records. Felker is related to the Gress family by his mother, who is a sister to Mrs. Rudolph Gress, mother of the dead girl. His father was a half-breed Indian. The son shows the Indian by dark skin, high cheek bones and black piercing eyes.

DESERTED HIS WIFE. He never returned to his young wife and son, who were then living at Stroudsburg. He deserted them and obtained work about the ice houses near Gouldsboro and succeeded by constant coaxing of his aunt, Mrs. Gress, in securing board at the Gress household. His attention to his cousin, Cora, were a matter of comment and Felker was warned to be careful.

FIRED AT THE GIRL. Felker suddenly whipped a revolver from his pocket and fired before the girl who saw the man's action in the mirror could turn. The ball struck her in the right cheek and plowed its way through the head and out on the opposite side.



Chief Detective S. W. Stillwell, of the county, at once set about to intercept the fugitive if he reached the city by railroad. A telephone message was received at police headquarters at 3 o'clock telling of the murder.

A short time after this Dr. C. R. Parke and Frank Gress, the latter a brother of the deceased girl, visited police headquarters. Dr. Parke is the Gress family physician. Frank Gress, the brother, is married and lives at 617 Lewis place, this city.
