HE IS WITH DEWEY. Edward Martin of This City Nine Years in Active Service. Carbondale's representative in the great victory at Manila is Edward Martin. He is a brother of E. J. Martin, of the Delaware and Hudson locomotive shop. He will be remembered by many of the young men of his own age as "Bruce" Martin, as he was familiarly called by the boys. He is now about twenty-nine years of age. He left home nine years ago and went to Buffalo, where he enlisted in the regular army. Not yet being of age he wrote home for the permission of his older brother, the head of the family. Soon after his enlistment he was ordered west and took part in the last campaign against Sitting Bull. He saw hard service on the frontier for three years, and when his term of enlistment expired decided to change for the other branch of the service. He enlisted in the navy at New York six years ago and has been in active service on the water ever since. He sailed on the Adams with the South Pacific squadron two years ago and has been in China waters since. When Admiral Dewey left Hong Kong for Manila he did not take the Adams with him as it is an old wooden cutter and would be of no use in a conflict. The news was transferred to the other vessels, mainly the battleships and on that gallant ship Carbondale's sailor boy took part in the crushing defeat of the Spaniards.
