STREET RAILWAY EXTENSION.

The intentions of the Scranton Street Railway company are good, so far as making the extension of the West Scranton line for which franchises were granted last fall is concerned, it is becoming very evident of late.

Along Lafayette street the poles are erected and rails distributed preparatory to the extension along this street to the Jackson street line. The line will be run along Bromley avenue from Swettland to Lafayette street and will be continued along Lafayette for a distance of about eight blocks.

The other of the three lines which are to be extended is the Luzerne Street line which at present ends at Twenty-second street. An obstacle has arisen here, however, which may prevent any extension at present if not also taking place the Keybank mine branch of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western company has to be crossed and permission to do this is very likely to be withheld.
