ATTORNEY D. W. BROWN DEAD.

Succumbs to Typhoid Fever at His Home in Dalton.

Attorney David W. Brown died early yesterday morning of typhoid fever at his home in Dalton, Ga.

Mr. Brown was 42 years old. He was born in Lathrop township, near Hopkinton, in Seneca county, N. Y., where his mother, Mrs. Zenas Brown now resides. His father is not living.

Mr. Brown studied law in Montrose with Little & Allen and entered the bar there in 1882. He practiced law there for five years and then relinquished practice to accept the principalship of Keystone academy at Factoryville. Three years later he came to Scranton and for nearly a year was associated with John R. Jones, now district attorney.

The funeral will be held at the house in Dalton at noon on Tuesday. The body will be taken to Montrose for interment.






