WOODBRIDGE'S FATE HAS BEEN DECIDED

VERDICT AGREED UPON AFTER COURT ADJOURNED.

It Was Sealed and Will Be Handed to Judge Edwards This Morning. Joseph Kilpatrick Tried for the Theft of Opera Glasses—Verdict Has Also Been Reached in That Case—Other Cases That Were Heard in Criminal Court Yesterday—Court House Notes.

The case against John Woodbridge who is charged with having woefully abused his 5-year-old niece, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Sheridan, was given to the jury yesterday morning at 10:30 o'clock. The jury agreed at 5 o'clock last evening and sealed its verdict. It will be brought into court this morning.

Joseph Kilpatrick, the Pine Brook youth who caused the police so much uneasiness last winter, was tried before Judge Edwards for the theft of a pair of opera glasses from the residence of George B. Hand on Jefferson avenue. Miss Anna Hand testified that the glasses were taken from the parlor of her father's residence about Feb. 25 last. She identified a pair of opera glasses found at the home of Kilpatrick as the ones taken from her father's residence.

The defendant swore that he found the glasses under a seat in the Academy of Music after a matinee one afternoon last winter. Another boy saw the glasses at about the same time he did and both made a dash under the seat for them. He was a little quicker than the other boy and secured the prize. The boy lived on the South Side but Kilpatrick was unable to give his name. He took the glasses home and gave them to his mother. The case was given to the jury at 4 o'clock, and a verdict was agreed upon and handed to the court this morning.

ATTEMPTED CRIMINAL ASSAULT. Patrick Daley, of Minooka, was tried before Judge Henry K. West in No. 2 on a charge of attempting to criminally assault Mrs. Michael D. Walsh, also of Minooka. The alleged offense was committed in the Walsh home. It was late at night and during the absence of Mrs. Walsh's husband she alleges that Daley secured an entrance into the house and got into bed with her.

She struggled desperately with him and got him from the bed chamber into the kitchen. He was so enraged at being foiled, Mrs. Walsh said, that he tramped on her toes, breaking one of them.

The defense was an alibi. He was able to explain where he spent the night of April 15, when the alleged offense was committed. Two witnesses swore they went home with Walsh that night. When they reached the house it was but a few minutes after the time Daley is supposed to have left. Yet Mrs. Walsh did not show any signs of having been in a struggle and did not make any complaint of an attempt having been made to assault her. The case went to the jury at 2:30 o'clock. A verdict was reached after adjournment and sealed.

Stephen Danfula, of Old Forge, was arraigned for selling liquor without a license and on Sunday, Constable Matthew Beam was prosecutor. Several witnesses were examined who swore that they bought liquor from the defendant. The latter said he was a bartender and that house had a license in the name of one John Spitz. The license register was produced and it showed that this contention was correct.

JUDGE BELIEVED HIM. Judge Edwards said there could be no conviction of selling liquor without a license and the case went to the side upon the matter of selling on Sunday. The verdict was not guilty but the defendant was directed to pay the costs.

Sylvester Pieliski, Anthony Oalaska and Stacey Orlako were called for trial in No. 2 on a charge of assault and battery, preferred by Adam Dorakowicz, of Throon. Orlako did not appear for trial and his bail was forfeited. The other two defendants were put on trial. It was alleged that they hit the prosecutor on the head with an
