

TRIAL LIST FOR CRIMINAL COURT

HAS BEEN COMPLETED BY DISTRICT ATTORNEY JONES.

Sessions Begin on December 4 and 316 Cases Are to Be Disposed of. The Kinney and Gallagher Murder Cases Are Set Down for Trial as Is Also the Cases Against the Mayfield Burglars—Judge Biddle of Carlisle Will Come Here to Assist the Local Judges.

District Attorney Jones completed yesterday the trial list for the coming criminal sessions, commencing Monday, December 4. He has placed 216 cases upon the list. The most important cases upon the list are the Mayfield burglars, the Kinney murder case, the murder case of Thomas Gallagher, Joseph Gallagher, Annie Gallagher and Bridget Dempsey.

Judge Edwards will preside during the first week in court room No. 1, and Judge Edward W. Biddle, of Carlisle, Cumberland county, Ninth Judicial district, will preside in court room No. 2.
