**ROUSED IRE OF DOCTORS**

**TWO BITS OF EXCITEMENT IN THE DUFFIN CASE.**

Colonel Martin, of Wilkes-Barre, Conducts the Cross Examination of Dr. Dolan and Dr. Roos in a Manner That Offended the Witnesses, and He is Twice Threatened with Violence—Two New Suits in Equity—Sheriff's Deeds Acknowledged.

Down in Luzerne county the stock in trade of even the best lawyers is abusive treatment of witnesses for the other side. District Attorney Martin, counsel for the plaintiff in the Duffin case, yesterday conducted the cross examination of Dr. Dolan and Dr. Roos in a manner that offended the witnesses, and he is twice threatened with violence—two new suits in equity—Sheriff's deeds acknowledged.

Dr. W. K. Dolan and Dr. E. G. Roos were the two who took especial umbrage at Colonel Martin's manner of conducting the cross examination. Dr. Dolan testified that he became acquainted with Miss Duffin at the home of his wife's parents, in West Scranton, where she was a guest at the time he was courting Miss McCann, now Mrs. Dolan. He said he frequently observed that Miss Duffin's eyesight was so bad that she had difficulty in making her way about the house and in recognizing even her most intimate friends.

The cross-examination Colonel Martin endeavored to show that some animosity prompted Dr. Dolan's testimony, and in this attempt he asked several questions that gave grave offense to Dr. Dolan. The latter continued to insist on his position for a moment, but as soon as he stepped out of the box, he went direct to Colonel Martin and said something in a low tone of voice that brought the colonel to his feet.

**THE DOCTOR'S THREAT.**

"Well, what are you going to do about it?" answered Colonel Martin. "I am going to slap your face if you will step outside this court room," replied Dr. Dolan, deliberately, but with evident rage.

Colonel Martin turned his head and Dr. Dolan walked to his seat. It was this same kind of questioning that aroused the ire of Dr. Roos. Colonel Martin's refusal to step out of the box, and after a series of questions to this end, came out with one that directly reflected upon the doctor's honor. It was: "Did you not tell Miss Duffin that if she did not pay you the balance of your bill, you would refuse to be a witness for her and would testify for the defense?"

"That's absolutely untrue. That's a lie. That's a made-up lie," the doctor fairly roared, half rising from his chair. He raised his right arm, and then, with both fists clenched, "I will not stand any insinuation. That reflects on my honor. I don't have to do it, even here, and I won't." The doctor's face was fairly purple, and he showed his teeth. By contrast showed off prominently the scar on his left temple, received during a little affair of honor at the University of Heidelberg. The very ardent sincerity of the doctor's declaration, coupled with his threatening attitude, had the effect of bringing Colonel Martin to a halt, while Dr. Roos was on the stand.

What precipitated the friction between Dr. Roos and Attorney Martin was a brief message at one of the court sittings, in which Dr. Roos was taking the stand. Colonel Martin strolled leisurely over to him and in a half-confidential manner requested him to "say nothing which would in any way reflect on the reputation of the defendant." The physician fired up instantly and turning to the attorney vehemently remarked: "I know how to take care of my own professional honor and I would advise you, sir, to do the same."

**DR. ROOS' TESTIMONY.**

Dr. Roos' testimony for the defense was to the effect that he treated Miss Duffin on the night of the accident and for several days thereafter; that he had no recollection of the accident, except a slight cut on the forehead; that she did not complain of any other injury, and that the cut on the forehead could not have affected her eyesight.

Mrs. Dolan, wife of Dr. Dolan, was one of the witnesses discovered since the former trial. How she came to be subpoenaed she did not know. At the time of the finding of a verdict of \$7,500 for Miss Duffin at the former trial she was in the city, but she was not present at the trial. It was not until she was subpoenaed that she came to the court. She testified that she had been suffering from defective eyesight for years before the accident took place. She thought no more of the matter until a police officer came to her residence with a subpoena.

**OTHER WITNESSES.**

Dr. Gilbert Murray, who examined Miss Duffin last week, and the defendant, testified that the trouble with her eyes was evidently a long standing one, and not the result of the accident in 1891.
