## THREE BOYS UNDER ARREST

### CHARGED WITH DISORDERLY CONDUCT ON MAIN AVENUE.

They Were Engaged in Annoying Pedestrians When Caught by Patrolman Davis—Lieutenant Williams Appointed Captain—Patrolman McColligan Discovered Something—West Side Driving Club Races Thursday—Mrs. Hearn Recovering.

John Daley, of 422 Chestnut street; John Donahue, of 228 West Lackawanna avenue, and Edith Clarke, of 426 Chestnut street, three boys who had for disorderly conduct, were each fined \$2 by Police Magistrate Davies.

For some time numerous complaints have been made to the police about boys who congregate on the sidewalks on Main avenue Sunday evenings and push one another into pedestrians going to and from church.

Patrolman David J. Davis caught the boys in the act Sunday evening and arrested young Clarke, who "pounded" on his companions, and incidentally placed the blame on them.

The warrant was sworn out yesterday and all three were brought in last night.

If the fines are not paid, the boys will each spend five days in jail.

This ought to serve as a warning to others, and the next ones arrested will be more severely dealt with, as the police are determined to break up this practice.

Parents who permit their boys to romp the streets when they ought to be in bed, cannot expect to keep them out of mischief.

It's Captain Williams Now. Lieutenant Thomas L. Williams, who has been in charge of the West Scranton precinct for the past eight years, was yesterday promoted to the captaincy of the city police force to succeed Captain John Davis, who will be placed in charge of the Jackson street house.

The promotion comes to him as well merited recognition of faithful service, and was unsolicited either by himself or his friends. The first intimation the lieutenant had of his promotion was when Director of Public Safety Worcester congratulated him yesterday on the appointment.

During his service in West Scranton the janitor of public school No. 13, on Bellevue heights, reported to the police late Sunday night that some one was in the building and that he had them locked in. He also stated that some one was in the building Saturday night, and that a woman known

to him was seen leaving the building early Sunday morning.

He claimed the entrance was effected through a window, which is about ten feet above the ground. Patrolmen McColligan and John Thomas searched the building from cellar to garret Sunday night, but could find no traces of anyone having been in there.
