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in repair for a period of five years, the price of repairs not to be included in price charged for laying pavements.

Sec. 2. Where new curbing is required or old curbing reset, the same shall be done by the city under the contract hereinafter provided for and the cost thereof collected according to the assessment for the first installment of the assessment hereafter provided.

Sec. 3. Upon the passage of this ordinance and the completion of the assessment for said improvements as hereinafter provided, the Director of Public Works shall advise the Director of Public Works of the amount of the assessment for each section one and two of the ordinance.

Proposals shall cover the entire work and shall include the cost of grading as shown on the profile of said improvement in the office of the department of Public Works, and the price for keeping said pavement in repair for five years.

Bidders shall enclose with each proposal the sum of one hundred dollars cash or certified check, as a guarantee to execute a contract for the work within twenty days if awarded the same. In case the bidder to whom the contract shall have been awarded fails to execute a contract for the work within the time specified in the ordinance, the City Recorder shall forfeit the sum of one hundred dollars to the City of Scranton, and the City Recorder shall have the right to execute the contract for the work and the City Recorder shall be paid for the same out of the sum of one hundred dollars.

Sec. 4. At the expiration of ten days from the passage of this ordinance, the chief engineer of the Bureau of Engineering of the Department of Public Works, shall proceed to make the assessments for said paving against abutting properties and give notice to all property owners of the time and place of making such assessments.

Sec. 5. Immediately after the completion of the said work the Chief Engineer shall file with the City Recorder, a final and correct schedule of said assessments.

Sec. 6. Said assessments shall be payable in five equal installments, the first installment shall become due and payable thirty days after the commencement of the work and the balance in four equal annual installments thereafter, said installments shall bear interest at the rate of six per centum per annum, commencing thirty days after the commencement of the work until paid, but parties may at any time pay the whole amount of the assessments.

Sec. 7. The commencement and completion of the work specified in this ordinance shall be the date when the work under proper contract is actually commenced and completed; and it shall be the duty of the Chief Engineer to certify to the City Recorder and the City Solicitor the date of the commencement of the work and the date of its completion, which certificate shall remain on file for the inspection of the public.

Sec. 8. Immediately upon the execution of the contract for the said work, the Chief Engineer shall certify the schedule of assessments to the City Recorder, who shall notify the owners or reputed owners by mail of the amount of their assessments and the terms of payment and such notice shall include this section of this ordinance. If either of said installments shall remain unpaid for two months after the same shall become due, the whole amount of the assessment remaining unpaid shall become due and payable, and said unpaid assessment shall immediately be certified to the City Solicitor for collection according to law.

Sec. 9. On the completion of the work the contractor shall be paid such amount as shall have been paid on said assessments in cash, and the balance shall continue to be a lien against said abutting property provided the contractor shall have executed the bond provided for in the third section hereof.

Sec. 10. The Recorder shall nominate and with the assent of the members of the Select Council appoint a competent practical man to inspect said work at a compensation of two dollars and fifty cents per day, for every day necessarily employed upon the work. The Department of Public Works shall keep a file of the Inspector's report.

Sec. 11. For the purpose of defraying the cost of said assessments and the inspection and incidental pertaining to said work there is hereby appropriated the sum of \$10,000 out of the City Treasury or so much thereof as may be necessary.

City Ordinance.

FILE OF SELECT COUNCIL, No. 18, 1901. As amended in Common Council, August 15, 1901.

AN ORDINANCE.

Providing for the Paving of Olive Street from Common Avenue to Madison Avenue with Sheet Asphalt Pavement on a Concrete Base, also Providing for the Setting of Curbstones on said Street between the Points Named; Providing Manner of Assessing and Collecting Costs of Said Improvement; and Approving Funds to be Paid for the Same.

Repealed.

Section 1 Be it ordained by the select and Common Councils of the City of Scranton, and it is hereby ordained by the authority of the same, that Olive Street from Adams Avenue to Madison Avenue be paved with the best quality sheet asphalt on a concrete base, and that curbstones be set on said street between the points above mentioned so far as the same shall be necessary; the cost of said improvement to be assessed against the abutting property according to the foot front rule, said assessment to be payable in five annual installments. All of said work to be done under the direction of the Department of Public Works, and in accordance with the plans and specifications therefor on file in the said department. Bidders shall state price at which they will contract to keep the pavement
