LEGAL. AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION PROPOSED BY THE CITIZENS OF THIS COMMONWEALTH FOR THEIR APPROVAL OR REJECTION BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY AT THE COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA, PUBLISHED BY ORDER OF THE SECRETARY OF THE COMMONWEALTH IN PURSUANCE OF ARTICLE XVIII OF THE CONSTITUTION.

A JOINT RESOLUTION. Proposing an amendment to section ten of article one of the Constitution of this Commonwealth, to wit: That a discharge of a jury for failure to agree or other necessary cause shall not be a ground for a new trial.
