FAINTED IN HIS PULPIT.

Rev. W. Hollinshed So Wrought Up by Experiences in Connection with Strike That He Collapsed

The congregation in the Presbyterian church at Forest City was greatly startled Sunday at the morning service by the sudden collapse of the pastor, Rev. W. Hollinshed. He was about to begin the sermon and feeling faint, informed his hearers that he was too ill to proceed. Dropping to a chair his head fell back and his limbs stiffened. Mrs. Hollinshed who sat in a pew near the pulpit hastened to his assistance followed by members of the congregation.

It was seen that he was unconscious and Dr. H. C. Noble was summoned. In a short time the doctor restored the patient to consciousness and he was removed to his home where he is now resting comfortably, although still weak.

The sudden illness of Mr. Hollinshed was due to the great nervous strain in connection with the strike. On October 3 an article signed "A Preacher of the Gospel" and dated Forest City, appeared in the New York Sun, under the caption "A Reign of Terror: A Voice from the Coal Fields." It gave the writer's views of the strike situation and created considerable stir in the community.

Union men who took offense at the article declaring that was a false representation of the situation, asked the clergyman to either renounce or admit the authorship of the article. Mr. Hollinshed announced that he wrote the article but said that it did not refer to local conditions but the situation in general. From thence on he was made to feel that he would thereafter be a stranger to a large number of the people of Forest City.

Saturday a package was left at the new manse addressed to Mr. Hollinshed. It contained a book which the clergyman had presented to some lad at a celebration gotten up by him for the breaker boys last Christmas. The leaves of the book were tracked and a hole had been put through the center while some words spelled out approximately "A Reign of Terror: A Voice from the Coal Fields." The clergyman was written on the inside of the cover.

This wrought on the nerves of Mr. Hollinshed who had been in poor health for some time and probably helped bring about the sensational falling spell on Sunday.
